Cochran summarizes Nebraska's fiscal policy as follows: 1-Resistance to pressure groups seeking greater expenditures. 2-Constitutional and legislative limitations upon spending by local subdivisions of govern-3—Efficient administration. 4-Avoidance of new forms of taxes. 5-Pay-as-you-go plan adhered to for all state expenditures.

When Nebraska turned up with a million dollar deficit a few years ago the folks hit the ceiling. The next legislature passed a law making it ntandatory for the state board of equalization to pass a levy sufficient to meet all appropriations.
