

FREDERICTON, N. B. (UP)-Bay of Fundy fisheries harvested 82,- 1938. 038,600 pounds of fish in 1957, practically all of which were caught in territorial waters, according to John 17-3w F. Calder, Welchpool, Campobello Island supervisor of fisheries.

The harvest of commercial fish included cod, haddock, hake, pollock, lobsters clams, gaspereau, salmon, shad, herring and sardines. Sardines alone yielded a catch of 35,639,700 pounds, to top the rest.
