

Cold Storage Plant Discussed Last Evening

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in family sized packages and stamped, showing the kind of meat.

From the cutting room the packages are taken to the second unit of the plant, a small room, known as the "sharp freezer." Here lies the secret of success of the frozen method of preserving food. Food scientists have discovered that if food, whether it be meat, certain vegetables or fruit is frozen very rapidly at low temperatures the minute ice crystals formed by this low temperature do not break down the fiber or tissue of the food so frozen and the result is the food, especially meat, is not only equal to its former flavor but is claimed by many to be superior. This sharp freeze room is held at a temperature of from 5° to 10° below zero and the packages are left here until they are thoroughly frozen.

After the packaged food has been thoroughly frozen it is taken to the third, or final, room of the plant. This is the room in which the lockers are located and it is maintained at a temperature of 12° to 15°. The packages are placed in the respective owners lockers there to remain until needed for consumption. These lockers are usually arranged in tiers of five high with aisles whereby access is easily had to all of them. The usual dimensions is 30 inches long, 20 inches wide and 17 deep and will hold approximately 250 lbs. of meat. It was shown that beef will keep 12 months, pork 5 or 6 months and poultry 18 months without any deterioration or loss of flavor whatsoever.

Considerable discussion was indulged in regarding the storing of fruits and vegetables by this method. It was brought out that peas, green beans, asparagus tips and sweet corn were especially adapted to the freezing method. The committee reported they saw roasting ears in a locker plant while on the inspection trip last week. These are but some of the possibilities of the cold storage locker system. Of the fruits, apricots, blackberries, raspberries, cherries, peaches and last, and by no means least, strawberries lend themselves admirably to this method of preserving. Thoughts of fresh strawberry shortcake at this time of year was indeed very interesting.

Mr. Wainwright showed a map of the state of Iowa showing, by spots, the location of locker plants scattered over the state. Though this locker system has been used in the middle west only a little over three years one ice machine company, with branches in Omaha, has installed over 180 plants in Iowa alone. Due to drought in Nebraska not so many plants have gone in although one Omaha company has installed nearly 50.

It was the consensus of opinion of those present at the meeting at Myrnard Friday evening that the best interests of the rural residents of northeast Cass county could best be served by locating their cold storage locker plant at Plattsmouth instead of Myrnard or Murray.

Before adjourning committee were appointed, with E. H. Spangler as chairman, to contact all farm operators in this territory and give them information regarding this modern method which bids fair to eliminate much of the drudgery connected with the preserving of meats, fruits and vegetables and which will give them the opportunity of adding fresh food to their winter diet.

When she heard the words that meant freedom to her, she dropped into a chair and put her hands to her face. The commonwealth sought to establish in the trial that Miss O'Connor felled Nancy Glenn with one blow of her fist and then dragged her to a mud puddle. There it was charged Miss O'Connor held the child's face in the water until Nancy drowned. All this was done, the commonwealth contended because Miss O'Connor and Nancy had quarreled over a bicycle and some dimes and pennies that Mary dropped into a mud puddle.
