J. A. Capwell Files Name for Renomination

Present Occupant of the Office to Submit Name to Democratic Voters in Primary.

Joseph A. Capwell, present county attorney, this morning made his filing for renomination on the democratic ticket for the office, submitting his name to the democratic voters at the election on August 9th.

Mr. Capwell has filed the office for the past two years in a very efficient manner and has the handling of a large number of criminal matters in both the county and district courts and in which he has conducted them without unnecessary expense to the county or special counsel being required.

Mr. Capwell served as county attorney in 1923 and for the past two years and his experience has been varied and covering many very difficult criminal cases.

The county attorney was a resident of the Elmwood community for many years and received his elementary education at that place, later attending and graduating from the law college of the University of Nebraska.
