

## Don Cotner is Star in Missouri Track Conference

Plattsmouth Well Represented at Meet by Don Cotner and Stuart Porter at Tarkio.

Don Cotner leaped 23 ft., 7 1/2 in., to set a new broad jump record as the Tarkio College track team won the Missouri conference championship at Fayette, Mo., Saturday. Tarkio scored a total of 59 1/2 points to far outdistance Missouri Valley and Westminster who finished second and third with 38 and 36 points. Tarkio won ten out of sixteen first places.

Cotner was runnerup for high point honors by adding to his broad jump victory, first in the 100 yard dash and second in the 220 yard dash. He also ran on the championship half mile relay team which came within one-tenth of a second of breaking the conference record of 1 min., 30.8 sec.

Stuart Porter won the discus championship with a toss of 134 ft., 7 1/2 in. Geo. Adam, former P.H.S. athlete has been the captain of the Tarkio team. He ran on the Owl mile relay team which failed to place. George is the only member of the squad who is a senior and Missouri sports writers are predicting that Tarkio track teams will dominate the conference for several years to come.

## Reverse Compensation of Jack Hatt

Judge W. W. Wilson Holds That Insurance Company and City Not Liable Under Law.

Reversing an award of \$15 per week from March 11, 1937 to August 31, 1937, made to Jack Hatt by the state compensation court, Judge W. W. Wilson today held that the young man was not legally a member of the fire department at the time he was injured.

Judge Wilson in his findings recites that on March 2, 1937, Jack Hatt was elected a member of the Plattsmouth fire department, that on March 3, 1937 the city council held a session and that on March 11, 1937 the young man was injured in a fire. The name was not certified to the city council until April 11, 1937, a month after the accident.

Citing the provisions of the law and courts ruling Judge Wilson held that the city and insurance company were not liable as the fireman had not been properly certified to the city clerk and confirmed by the council.

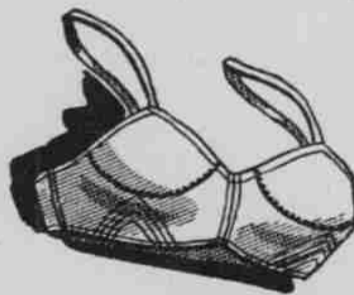

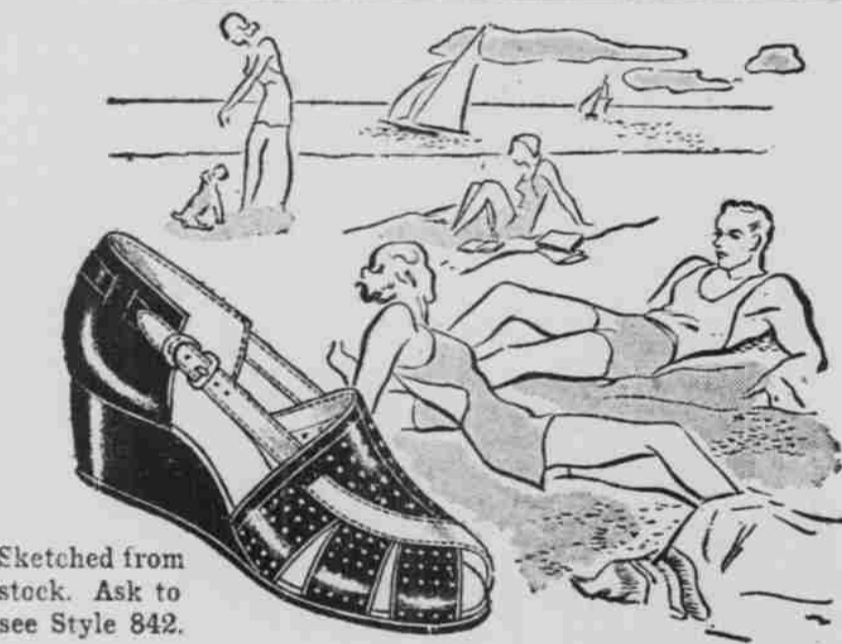
