CONTRACT FOR NEW ROOF ON THE COMMUNITY BLDG.

The American Legion trustees last night let the contract for a new roof on the community building, where leaks the last few months have permitted water to come through the ceiling and stand on the maple floor in certain spots. The new roof is to be of 55 pound roofing applied with five-inch cemented overlaps and "blind" nailing. The roof is to be applied by Hermon Tickotter and carries a ten-year maintenance guarantee. It will be laid over the present two-ply built-up roof that was placed on the building when it was opened in 1927.

The new roof is to be completed about July 1st.

Interior painting and other improvements had added to the appearance of the building and the trustees have been directed to consider installation of gas heating units in the main auditorium before fall, replacing the present furnaces that were a gift from the Masonic lodge at the time the building was opened, being removed from the Masonic building at that time to be replaced by a more modern heating system.

A few years ago there was grave danger of the building being lost to the community and transformed into a garage building as payments on building indebtedness lapsed. As a result of Community Building club membership, delinquent payments have not only been caught up, but a very sizeable reduction made in the outstanding amount and improvements are being made as rapidly as conditions warrant.

Legion officials say the organization still stands ready to turn the building over to the city any time it may desire to add the second story with no strings tied to the offer, except a place provided for holding regular Legion meetings.

There is surviving the husband, two daughters, Mrs. Rebecca Wetmore and Mrs. Varda Bass, Kansas City, Missouri; three sons, George, and Sherman of Omaha and David of Council Bluffs; niece, Jesse Powers of Council Bluffs; brothers, Floyd Kneer, Exter, California and Orin Kneer of Lincoln.
