Will Fight Hoppers Another Way.

In 1879, just 59 years ago, there was a scourge of grasshoppers which flew in clouds so thick as to shut out the sun and make the day look like night and they would devour all vegetation. Some inventive genius built some vats like that used for the making of sorghum which were filled with oil and with a horse dragged it through the fields, and many hoppers were caught in the vacuum pan and killed with the oils which the pan contained.

Other experiments have been tried one of which has been the popular using of poison bran, which has been in a measure successful but still not bringing the desired results.

Henry Wessell has just completed a device for the extermination of the hoppers which is a galvanized tank eight feet in length with a back board of perhaps twenty inches high and a board and screen wire attached. The vat or tank is placed on the front of an auto. This tank is filled with oil, either kerosene, tractor fuel or distillate where the hoppers are thrown into the oil which kills them. Mr. Wessell says the apparatus will cost about \$4 when completed, and the fence rows and weed patches can be combed and the hoppers very rapidly exterminated. Ask him about the apparatus.
