Missouri River Continues at Its High Stage Here

Much of the Lowlands East of the Burlington Station Is Under Water From Overflows.

The mighty Missouri river which in its turbulent periods defies harnessing, is again on the rampage and the waters at flood stage is now seeping out into the farming lands in the bottoms.

The Ray Herold farm which lies east and north of the ferry road, is now well covered by the flood water, and the growing corn stands in several inches of water.

The water now surrounds the Missouri river dock as the water from the old first channel is now filling in from the west and threatening the road that is being built to the dock.

The flood water has come into the farming lands of T. H. Pollock south of the water pumping station and is gradually growing more in evidence.

South of the city along the lines where reatment and dykes have been constructed, the water is overflowing into the made lands and will be of value in depositing silt on the new land.

Water is reported to be into the farming lands at the Gilmour place and other farms which have lowlands.

The rising water has threatened the large rock dyke that was built east of Rock Bluffs.

APPLES ARE DAMAGED
