Gas. Schools, Parks, Paving, Sewers and Engine House-Lust Call to Get on The Ballot.

Now that election comes within twenty days, it is possible to know just how much the voters are asked to bond the city for various purposes. Until Monday it had been possible for county commissioners of one or more of the various bodies to have submitted propositions, but this is now no longer possible for the general election But the sum of all bond propositions is greater by far than has ever been sub mitted to voters of any general election day in the city of Omaha, the aggregate amount being \$4,179,000, divided as follows: Gas Works bonds, \$3,560,660; school building bonds, \$500,000; park bonds, \$50,000; paving intersection bonds, \$50,000; sewer bonds, \$49,000, and engine house bonds, \$30,000.

With the exception of the gas and engine house bonds the issues for which approvals are asked are all in the way of necessary public improvements. No more paving can be done until after the intersection bonds are issued and the construction of a number of storm sewers depends upon the Issuance of the sewer bonds.

The construction of a school building in the Vinton district hinges upon the issuance of the bonds asked by the school board, as does also necessary extension of the high school building. The present building is crowded and other rooms must be pro vided for the work. .

Land for Park System. The park bonds are required by the Park board for the purchase of land needed for the general park system and by the mem

bers of the Park board and those inter-

ested in the development of the system are

considered as important as any other. The gas and engine house bonds are upon a different footing. The gas bond proposition was originally submitted by Councilman Funkhouser as an effort to redeem one of the pledges of the democratic platform which had promised "dollar gas" for Omaha consumers. An ordinance prepared by Mayor Dahlman to attempt to force the gas company to sell gas at that rate was defeated by Mr. Funkhauser, who later offered a resolution providing that unless the company granted a rate of \$1 per 1,000 cubic feet of gas on or before July 1, the council would take steps to secure a plant for the city. The price was not reduced, and the ordinance followed, but not for several weeks. The time between July 1 and the date of the introduction of the ordinance was used by Mr. Funkhouser in an attempt to ascertain the probable cost of a gas plant. He secured figures ranging from \$1,500,000 to \$3,500,000, and adopted the

The engine house proposition is the child of Councilman Bedford, who desires a fire engine house near Twenty-fourth street and Ames avenue. While such a house is regarded as absolutely necessary from the standpoint of the fire department, there is some question as to the wisdom of issuin bonds at this time, as the chief of the fire department says it will be impossible to secure men and equipment for additional houses until after the next session of the legislature, when the amount of money available for fire department purposes may be increased. As the legislature does not meet until 1909 no money will be available for manning the proposed house until 1910. For this reason it is urged by many members of the council, who were in the minority, that the proposed issuance of bonds should go over until next fall.

The city clerk is preparing the buildts for election of members of the school board and drawing up the form of proclamation which must be issued by the mayor this week The proclamation will include mention of all bonds to be submitted by the city, while the proclamation of the county clerk will announce the election of of-

It will be necessary this year to elect members of the Board of Education by ballot, since there is only room on the voting machines for all other candidates and bond propositions. This condition is not as disagreeable as it might be under other circumstances, for there is practically but one ticket in the field for memb, a of the school board and the counting of votes will be perfunctory.

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
