PRESIDENT STANDS BY GUNS

Says His Policy Has Been to Punish Dishonesty.

NOT SCARED BY PANIC TALK

Neither Demagogue Nor Reactionary Can Drive Him from His Course—Leaves Nashville for Chattanooga.

NASHVILLE, Oct. 23.—Never before has Nashville been so elaborately decorated as it was today, when welcoming President Roosevelt. Bunting, flags, banners and pictures of the president were almost everywhere.

President Roosevelt in a speech at the Auditorium hotel, said: "There has been trouble in the stock market in the high financial world, during the last few months. The statement has frequently been made that the policies which I stand responsible for that trouble. Now, gentlemen, these policies of mine can be summed up, in one sentence. They represent the effort to punish successful dishonesty. I doubt if these policies have had any material effect in bringing about the present trouble, but if they have, it will not alter my determination that for the remaining sixteen months of my term these policies shall be persevered in."

"If to arouse that type of civic manhood in our nation it was necessary to suffer any temporary commercial depression, I should consider the cost but small. All we have done has been to unseat the wrongdoer. It was not the fact that it was unseated that did the damage. All I did was to turn on the light. I am responsible for turning on the light, but I am not responsible for what the light shows. It is impossible to cut out a cancer without making the patient feel for a few days rather sicker than he felt before. No material well-being can save this nation if it loses the light towards higher things. It will permit the reactionary on the other to drive me away from the course or policy which I regard most vital for the well-being of this nation."

"Honesty Worthy of Praise. "And the thing most important to remember is that that policy has two sides. It would indeed be an evil day for the nation if it were permitted to grow up a spirit which would discriminate against the honest man who achieved business success. There is nothing meaner than hatred of the man who prospers honestly simply because he has prospered, and it challenges the spirit of every good American when I say that the honest railroad, the honest banker and the honest business man is the man who makes a fortune because his exceptional business ability enables him to render exceptional service to his country. If ever there should be any temporary gusts of popular feeling that demand what is wrong, what is unrighteous, then the true servant of the people is the man who disregards that temporary whim of the people to do evil. (Great applause.)"

"No man will stand more strongly than I will in the defense of property, so long as it is honestly acquired and honestly used. (Cheers.) I will stand against crimes of brutal violence, just as I stand against crimes of unscrupulous cunning. There are certain men who say that I have talked against men of wealth as such. Those gentlemen are blind if they see the facts in that light. I will protect every way in my power honest property. I will protect the honest man to the extent of my ability, and in no way can I so materially aid the honest man of wealth as by doing all in my power to bring to justice his brother, of dishonestly gained wealth. Our whole movement is simply and solely to make the dealogue and the golden rule of some practical moment in the business life of the community." (Great applause and cheers.)

At the Hermitage the president spoke briefly in eulogy of Andrew Jackson. Shortly afterward he departed for Chattanooga.

FRENCH ARE DRIVEN BACK

Arrival of General Drude Saves Small Column from Annihilation.

CASABLANCA, Sunday, Oct. 20, via Tangier, Oct. 23.—The timely arrival of General Drude with reinforcements alone saved Colonel de Fretay's reconnoitering column from annihilation yesterday near Tadder. The troops which Fretay sent out to search for a Frenchman, wandered from the camp and encountered the enemy consisting of a detachment of cavalry and a company of infantry. On arriving at Alvarez a troop of sixty Moorish horsemen was seen on top of a mound. Colonel de Fretay ordered a squadron of regular Algerian cavalry to give chase, and he himself pursued was kept up for about three miles, when suddenly the hills beyond were seen to be swarming with horsemen. The Algerian troops realizing that they had fallen into a trap, retired slowly. The column, which had been marching in the direction of Tadder, was now in a position to occupy a position with the infantry and Spahis in reserve behind the walls of some Marabout tombs, deploying a force of Chasseurs d'Africa and Algerian regulars to the northeast.

The Moors, who were constantly being reinforced, began their march movement with the object of turning the French position, but were momentarily checked by the sustained fire of the infantry and a hail of bullets from the rapid fire guns. Nevertheless, the situation was growing critical. Fully 5,000 white clad Moorish warriors threatened to overwhelm Colonel de Fretay's column. At this juncture arrived with two batteries of field artillery and another section of the rapid fire battery, and opened fire. The Moors were taken completely by surprise, and taking advantage of the confusion into which the quick masses of the Algerian regulars in a furious charge into the ranks of the Moors, the Algerians sabering the enemy right and left. The Moors were unable to withstand the impetuosity of the attack and broke and fled.

After the French general forced his troops into two hollow squares and moved eastward toward the French position, the cover of the artillery. TANGIER, Oct. 22.—According to semi-official information received at the Spanish legation here today, the French forces at Casablanca, under the command of General Drude, suffered a serious repulse at the battle of the Moorish camp. Moorish troops, estimated to number 7,000 men, and equipped with field guns and modern rifles, not only drove the French back to the city walls, but menaced the town to the extent that the French authorities felt it expedient to request aid from a Spanish warship in the harbor to repel the attack. Castle Anfoof, located at Timourin, near Mogador, which is known to hold 500,000, is endangered by the advance of the third division under Mulai Hafid. The castle is being defended by Calid Anfoof, himself, who represents the sultan. The French troopship Artois left here today hurriedly with troops and machine guns on board. This ship is going to the assistance of Calid Anfoof. The transportation of the force is seriously hampered by the lack of ships and the outrageous charge of the transportation companies.

With the sewer question out of the way for the present the city engineer was ordered to prepare an ordinance providing for the construction of a viaduct over the tracks of the Omaha & Southwestern railway on Nineteenth street, south of William street.

New ordinances introduced included one to pave Lake street from Sherman avenue to Eighteenth street, one to evaluate bakeries to prevent their operation in basements, and one to grant permission to the Union Pacific railroad to operate two spur tracks across Webster street between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets; leaving assessments for improvements on several streets.

By resolution Thomas F. Swift was ordered to cease grading on the alley in block 254 until further notice. The city engineer was instructed to prepare an ordinance ordering the construction of a viaduct over the tracks of the Omaha & Southwestern Railway company at Nineteenth street, south of William street.

The effort of Loyal Albert to obtain the sign ordinance to a referendum vote was unsuccessful. A resolution to create the office of assistant plumbing inspector was referred to the committee of the whole.

Councilman McGovern, by request, introduced an ordinance making it illegal for bakeries to be operated in basements and providing that all bakeries shall be operated in rooms in sanitary condition. The comptroller presented a statement of the condition of funds October 16, including Ordinance No. 65 (September bills), then pending, as follows:
