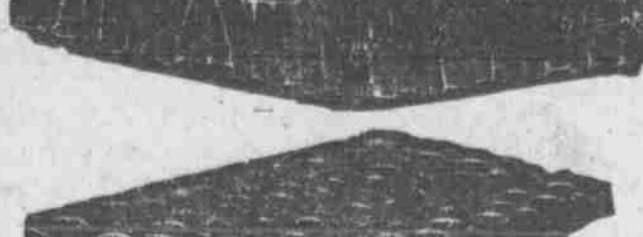

AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Officers Likely to Be Disappointed About Moving Into City Hall.

BUILDING NOT YET COMPLETED

Anti-Annexationists Angry at City Clerk Gillin Because Records of His Office Make Bad Showing for Their Cause.

There is some prospect that the city officials will not be able to enter the new city hall today or Sunday, as had been planned. Some obstacles are in the way. The first place the building is not completed, and will not be for some time. The contractor has not announced the completion of the building, nor will he be inclined to yield possession until he is paid in full. When asked if he would yield possession he said he would, provided he was paid in full. But he cannot be paid in full until he legally notifies the mayor and council that the building is complete, and not then until the building is inspected and approved.
