ELECTION OF RUSSIAN DUMA Sunday's Returns Show that Third Body Will Be Strongly Conservative.

ST. PETERSBURG. Oct. M .- The results of the final election held today in the greater part of European Russia, the Caucauses and Asiatic Russia show atrongly conservative nature of the new election law. For the first time in Rusmia's parliamentary history, the constituleft are confronted by an overwhelming majorliy of reactionaries, conservatives and moderate constitutionalisis, who support the government program of reform.
