

MAYOR WILL CLOSE THE CITY
Accedes to Demand for Rigid Observance of Sabbath Laws.
ALL MUST GO INTO EFFECT

Millennium Will Set in Tenth of December, Same Day When Screens Fall from All of the Saloons.
Waiving his right to five days' grace, Mayor Dahlman has decided to comply with the demand of Charles E. Fields and issue a proclamation for the rigid enforcement of the Sunday observance law as contained in section 24, chapter 23, of the Criminal Code of Nebraska, which reads: "If any person of the age of 14 years or upward shall be found on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, sporting, rioting, quarreling, hunting, or shooting, he or she shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$20, or be confined in the county jail for a term not exceeding twenty days, or both, at the discretion of the court. And if any person of the age of 14 years or upward shall be found on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, at common labor (work of necessity and charity only excepted) he or she shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$5 or less than \$1; providing nothing herein contained in this proclamation governing Sunday shall be construed to extend to those who conscientiously observe the seventh day of the week as the Sabbath, nor to prevent families emigrating from traveling, women from leaving the passengers, superintendents or keepers of toll bridges or toll gates from attending and superintending the same, or ferrymen from conveying travelers over the water, or persons from moving their families on such days or to prevent railroad companies from running necessary trains.

But the mayor will not content himself with adding simply by this statute, he will include in his proclamation a summary of the various laws which he thinks come under his jurisdiction. At any rate he figures that by the time the thing is through with Omaha will be bottled up ten times worse than Schley had the Spanish fleet in the Cuban waters, giving to the citizens a repetition of New England's blue laws.
Asks for Legal Light.
Monday morning the mayor wrote a letter to the legal department in which he requested the city attorney to furnish him with a statement showing just how far his jurisdiction extends over the laws of the state and to give him a list of the ordinances which may be affected by the order. As soon as this has been received he will formulate his order. On this subject he says: "Now that the terms of the Sackett law have been invoked I have no alternative but to enforce all of the laws governing Sunday observance and such orders as may be brought to my attention. I have no use for half way measures. Either the mayor should have some discretion or he should have none and it seems as though under the laws of Nebraska he has none. This business of being called upon to enforce specific laws is unnecessary when the situation is understood, and to save others the trouble of studying to find out where I am falling in my duty I have put the matter up to the legal department. When it has acted I will know just what the city's lawyers think I should be expected to enforce under a strict construction of the law. If this list doesn't suit the citizens—if it is not broad enough all they will have to do is to tell me and I'll see that the list is made long enough to cover everything.

"I don't want to do this, but I have nothing to say about it. There is the law and there are the men clamoring for its enforcement. I never yet shirked from a duty and I'm not going to do it now, no matter how much it displeases me."

UNCLE SAM TO SUE RAILWAY
War Department Wants Union Pacific to Pay for Damage from Overflow.

It has been decided by the War department to ask the attorney general to bring suit against the Union Pacific Railroad company to recover damages sustained by the government to the buildings and property stored at the quartermaster depot in Omaha, caused by the overflow of water during rain storms in July and August this year. It is stated that the overflow was made possible by the filling up of a creek along the tracks of the railroad by that company, which cast the water during the heavy storms over the depot grounds, damaging buildings, roads and supplies. It is held by the quartermaster department that the tracks of the railroad company, as now existing, have the effect during heavy rains of collecting the water and discharging it in bulk over the depot grounds, the provision for carrying the water under the tracks being inadequate for that purpose.

A board of survey was recently convened to ascertain the amount of damages resulting to the depot from the overflow and fixed the amount at \$2,100. The Union Pacific holds that suit should be brought against the city for the alleged damages and has up-to-date brought against the city for the alleged damages and has up to this time refused to make settlement with the government.
