Though Ty Cobb secured an average of 200 against the on ottchers in the world's series, for whigh he has had much ridicule heaped on him, the Georgia wonder is not the only great hitter who has failen down lamentably in a world's series.

In 1900, for instance, Hans Wagner, the greatest of all sluggers, was the laughing stock of the Boston enthusiasts, because he failed to but up to anything like his form against Cy Young and Dineen. Hans fell down as did Cobb, But, years before that, "Tip" O'Neil, then the leading butsman in the old American association, proved the weakest hitter on the St. Louis Browns' roster in a championship series for the title of the universe in 1851. In the association that year O'Neil wound up with a batting average of 465, perhaps the big-

gest average ever made by a player, yet he did not but 150 against the Detroit pitchers.

"Sox" Seybold was a joke with the stick against the Giants' pitchers in the series of 1906.

So Cobb's failure to annihilate the Cub twirlers was not such a wonderful reversal of form after all.

Frank Mount Pleasant of the Carlisle Indians has been at the Indian school for fourteen years. Mount Pleasant, in color, is nearly white, and his articulation of the English language is perrect.
