

YORK TOO MUCH FOR OMAHA

Final Score of the Game is Eighteen to Five.

MOST SCORING IN SECOND HALF

Forward Pass and Line Smashes by York the Features of the Contest—Injuries to Players Are Few.

YORK, Neb., Nov. 8.—(Special Telegram.)—For the third time York High school defeated Omaha on the gridiron here. The York champions realized that in Omaha they would have to play one of the games of their lives. Omaha, having a record of winning every game this year, believed they could win here, and they played one of the best games ever seen on York's grounds. Omaha won the toss, choosing the north goal. Selby kicked to Henderson, who returned it twenty-five yards. York lost the ball on a fumble. Omaha was forced to punt, the ball being exchanged on both sides on account of fumbling. Scott punted for a gain of eight yards. Derrick and Bell carried the ball up to the two-yard line and Derrick carried it over for the first touchdown. Bell kicked a difficult goal. Score: York, 6; Omaha, 0. Omaha kicks to York. York returns thirty-five yards. Omaha was penalized five yards for tackling outside of bounds. Omaha punted for a thirty-five yard gain. Easton for Omaha, carried the ball for a touchdown. Omaha failed to kick goal. Score: York, 6; Omaha, 0. Both teams exchanged punts. Omaha forces the ball to York's fifteen-yard line, when time is called, ending the first half.

Welch of York was injured and put out of the game. York punts back forty yards. Selby of Omaha was injured and taken out of the game. Omaha makes a forty-yard gain on a forward pass and was forced to punt. York used the forward pass and made good gains, and Derrick carried the ball for the third touchdown on line smashes. Records of Other Batting Wonders in World's Series:
Though Ty Cobb secured an average of .36 against the '06 pitchers in the world's series, for which he has had much ridicule heaped on him, the Georgia wonder is not the only great hitter who has fallen down lame in a world's series.
In 1903, for instance, Hans Wagner, the greatest of all sluggers, was the laughing stock of the sport enthusiasts, because he failed to bat up to anything like his form against Cy Young and Dintzen. Hans fell down in the last year of his career, that "Tip" O'Neil, then the leading batsman in the old American association, proved the weakest link on the St. Louis Browns roster in a championship series for the title of the universe in 1897. In the association that year O'Neil's average was a batting average of .26, perhaps the big-
