CORNHUSKERS GET REVENGE

Defeat the Jayhawkers on Their Own Grounds at Lawrence.

KANSAS' ONLY SCORE ON FUMBLE

Nebraska's Superiority Hardly Told by the Score, as the Element of Luck Was Against Them.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Nov. 9.—(Special Telegram.)—Nebraska avenged last year's humiliation with a vengeance on McCook this afternoon, defeating Kansas without the slightest difficulty by the score 16 to 6.

Once again, later in the half, Kansas tried for another goal from the field, but the attempt failed, and the Cornhuskers were never again in the slightest danger.

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With the ball in the center of the field and in possession of Nebraska Captain Weller, after two downs, executed a short kick of about twenty-five yards.

Doane kicked off and Brown immediately punted. An exchange of punts followed as neither team was able to gain consistently through the line, or around the ends.

INDIAN BREAKS DOWN IN AN ATTEMPT AT FORTY-FIVE YARDS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The long distance runners of the Metropolitan section of the Amateur Athletic union have been discussing the showing that Tom Longboat made in his attempt to run the forty-five miles between Hamilton and Toronto recently.

Longboat was carrying a mile in the automobile which followed him, and then got out to run again, only to break down for the second time when within half a mile of the finish.

Longboat completed the first eight and three-quarter miles in fifty-eight minutes and the twenty-eight and three-quarter miles in three minutes less than four hours.

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REDS WIN FROM CRIMSON

Harvard Foot Ball Team Outclassed by Carlisle Indians.

VICTORS PLAY BRILLIANT GAME

Forward Passes, Long Runs, Delayed Kicks and Cross Passes Follow Each Other in Rapid Succession.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 9.—The memory of previous defeats was forgotten today in the victory of the Carlisle Indians over Harvard by a score of 23 to 13.

The Carlisle Indians were comparatively easy for the Crimson players to push the ball over for a score. One of the Harvard goals from touchdown was missed, but little Mount Pleasant, the Indian quarterback, kicked three of four attempts.

Mount Pleasant ran his team with speed and the selection of plays was well varied. His brilliant effort was his dash of seventy-five yards through the end of the Harvard eleven for a touchdown shortly after the beginning of the second half.

The play was one of the most sensational seen on Soldiers' field for many years. The Indians' quarterback caught a Harvard pass on his own thirty-yard line and dashed straight for the assembling players. It seemed a hazardous play, but he proved too slippery for the Crimson men and went through the greater portion of the Harvard eleven like a greased pig and after shaking himself clear he eluded Newhall who was between him and the goal, and then dashed for the line.

Forward Pass Wins. The other three Indian touchdowns were made through their success in carrying off the forward pass.

The first Harvard score came through a fumble by Carlisle on his own seven-yard line and two minutes after the Harvard play followed on the next few minutes on the part of Carlisle, during which there was a futile attempt at a goal from the field. Finally the Indians secured the ball on the Carlisle's forty-yard line and rushed it to the twenty-five-yard line on a delayed pass. Another forward pass sent it to the ten-yard line, and after two plunges in the center, Mount Pleasant again signaled for the new play and the ball was tossed directly to the goal-line, fast-out-of-reach of any Harvard players, none of whom were anticipating such a play.

Carlisle's goal from the field came soon after and brought the score up to 12 to 10 at the end of the first half.

In the second half, after Mount Pleasant's sensational dash for a touchdown, soon came the only Harvard rally in the game. From Carlisle's fifty-yard line Harvard pushed the Indians steadily back twenty-five yards, where a forward pass was attempted and made by a Carlisle player. Harvard recovered the ball on the Indians' five-yard line and rushed it across in three plays. After this the Indians' goal was never in danger. This was followed by another Carlisle forward pass and score.

WABASH DEFEATS ST. LOUIS

DIFFICULT SURGICAL OPERATION.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 9.—Richard Swanger, who was unconscious for eleven days from a depressed fracture of the skull, caused by a tree falling upon him, is recovering from a remarkable surgical operation as a result of which he carries a quantity of gold leaf in his head. The surgeons at Maryland University hospital said that the brain itself adhered to the skull. The brain covering and the gray matter were separated and the gold leaf was placed between the parts.

EXHIBITION OF OPEN FOOT BALL.
