A day or two since Mr. Stoner received in formation from the ascayer to the effect that the sand shows .04 ounces of gold to a ton and 22 ounces of silver to a ton, there being 80 cents worth of gold and 14 cents worth of sliver in a ton, a total value of 34 cents a ton for the sand and gravel found on the farm.
