States a Fast, Forgets a Principle. OMAHA, Nov. 12.-To the Editor of The In his Milwaukee speech Mr. Bryan said that the railroads desire federal control to "escape" state control. He states a fact which nobody disputes, but forgets a principle.

As to the fact, the hunted Harriman himself was among the first to flee to the federal power for protection to railroad interests against the uprising in every state legislature in the country to slaughter them. He was instantly joined by every other strong representative of the railroads, although it was everywhere known that Mr. Roosevelt was wielding the whole power of the government to destroy and mprison him. Every politician in the republican leadership in the states, in and out of the legislatures, set on with a roaring "sick 'em" from the White House, opened a war on rates which the president himself declared were "low enough," and laws were enacted, without examination of the facts, cutting freight and passenger rates in nearly every state, including New York, in which Governor Hughes met one of those laws with a vigorous veto.
