farm implement factories have been closed Chicago reports 90 per cent of the factories have either closed down, reduced forces or shortened hours. From Pittsburg comes the report that within a radius of 100 miles 48,000 men have been laid off by the factories while the reduction of forces in railroad work will reach 2,000. From Grand Rapids, Mich., where big furniture factories are located, it is reported that countermands in orders have caused a number of factories to close while all are running on short time.
