**Real Case of Small-Pox—**Alvin Hanson from Burlington, Ia., reported at the office of the health commissioner at the city hall Friday at noon with a fully developed case of small-pox. He was taken to the emergency hospital.

**Two New Diphtheria Cases—**Two new cases of diphtheria were reported at the deaf and dumb institution Thursday. All inmates have been given anti-toxin treatment and the authorities say that the disease is under control. So far the cases have been mild.

**Hero of San Juan Hill—**William Merritt, an attorney of Red Oak, Ia., is a guest at the Paxton hotel. He was a member of Roosevelt's regiment and took part in the battle of San Juan hill. His brother was Darwin Merritt, who was blown up on the battleship Maine.

**Petitions for Repaving—**Petitions for the repaving of Fifteenth street from Farnam to Douglas and Twelfth street from Ninth to Sixteenth are complete, and ordinances for this work will be introduced in

time to have the work started as soon as funds are available next year.

**Thief Steals Tobacco and Shells—**A thief got into the Missouri Pacific freight house at Fifteenth and Nicholas streets Thursday afternoon and stole a case containing 500 shotgun shells and a butt of chewing tobacco. He got away without leaving any clue behind as to his identity.

**Car of Insane Soldiers—**Another car of insane soldiers from the Philippines will pass through Omaha Sunday night enroute from San Francisco to Washington over the Union Pacific, Milwaukee and Pennsylvania lines. They will be in charge of Lieutenant Colonel G. H. Tarney.

**Otogramian Found Dead in Bed—**John Davis, aged 80 years, was found dead in his bed at the county hospital Friday morning. His death was due to heart failure. He has three sons and a daughter living in Omaha and Benson and they will take charge of the funeral arrangements.

**Thief Can Beat the Gas Company—**A thief discovered a new way of beating the gas company and his first experiment netted him and cost the company \$2. He lapped the gas slot meter at Mrs. Sullivan's residence, 206 Burt street, Thursday while the family was away and got \$9 in quarters.

**Land For Cut-Off Lake Park Cheap—**The appraisers to fix the value of land needed for Cut-Off lake park held session at the office of the Park commission Friday morning. Persons living on the land affected were present and some of them offered to sell land at prices which they claimed would pay little more than the cost of moving the buildings to other sites.

**New Mileage Book—**A new interchange mileage book will be issued December 15, good on all the lines of the Western Passenger association east of the Missouri river. The book will contain 2,000 mileage strips good for one year from date of sale and will be sold for \$40 with no rebate. The Milwaukee road will sell a 2,000 mile book good on all Milwaukee rails east of the Missouri river for \$30 with no refund.

**Successor to Ensign Blackburn—**Lieutenant Commander D. F. Neal, United States navy, has been assigned to duty as recruiting officer for the Omaha naval station, to succeed Ensign Paul Blackburn, who has been transferred to sea duty with the cruiser Milwaukee of the Pacific squadron. Lieutenant Commander Neal is now on recruiting duty at Indianapolis. He will relieve Ensign Blackburn at Omaha November 23.

**Floral Society Prizes—**The Omaha Floral society held a regular monthly meeting at the offices of the Park board Thursday night. A feature of the meeting was a display of chrysanthemums. Friday morning members of the park commission awarded first honors to Herman Brothers of Council Bluffs, and second to L. Henderson of Omaha. The first prize winners were white and measured twenty inches around and thirteen inches across.

that not guilty of disturbing the peace on a street car by a jury in Judge Troup's court Friday morning. It was charged that the two got into a controversy with the conductor because they wanted the side curtain down while the conductor wanted it up. D. Blumenthal according to the conductor stopped the car and held it for some time threatening the motorman in case he should start up. Judge Troup in his instructions held that the conductor had the right to say whether or not the side curtain should be up or down. The men were each fined \$5 and costs in police court and appealed to the district court.

**Crawford Gets the Verdict—**W. H. McCree, George Q. Carey and Walter A. Anderson failed to secure a verdict against Crawford in Judge Estelle's court Friday. The plaintiffs asserted Crawford made an agreement to deliver them thirty-five steers at their ranch at Idaho Falls, Idaho, and his failure to do so had damaged them to the amount of \$750. Crawford contended the agreement was that they should call for the cattle at his ranch in Jackson Hole, Wyo., and cut them out of the herd. He said he had all his cattle corralled and waited several days for them, but they failed to come and he put in a counterclaim for \$1,000. The jury returned a verdict for Crawford.

**Paving Held Up by Injunction—**Daniel Hannon, a paving contractor, has secured a restraining order from Judge Kennedy to prevent the paving of Q street, South Omaha, between Twentieth and Twenty-fourth streets by the National Construction company to whom the contract was awarded. Hannon contends he submitted the lowest bid to the council and was the only one of the contractors who carried out the terms of the specifications by submitting samples of vitrified paving block with his bid. He charges there is a conspiracy to prevent him from doing the work and to award the contract to the National Construction company. The restraining order runs against Mayor Hoctor, William T. Martin, president of the city council and City Clerk Gillen and forbids their signing the contract until the case is heard in court.

**LECTURE ON LIGHT WAVES**  
Dr. Frederick Millener makes an interesting talk at Trinity Cathedral.

Dr. Frederick H. Millener delivered a popular lecture on wireless telegraphy and light waves at the crypt of Trinity cathedral Thursday night to an interested audience. This is one of a series of lectures the doctor is to deliver at this place during the winter, the lectures being given each Thursday evening. In language easily understood by the men not familiar with technical terms the speaker explained the nature of the rays of light not directly perceptible by human senses and showed the various instruments used to bring those rays within the knowledge of man where they could be made to perform useful functions. In the course of his remarks he said that the Roentgen ray had at first been received as a paradox by physicians and surgeons, who used it often without knowing what they were doing, with the result that it had fallen into disrepute and is not now being used as much as it should be by persons capable of handling it.

He spoke of wireless telegraphy and illustrated his remarks by exhibiting a receiving apparatus for wireless messages. Next Thursday night he will speak of the electron theory of matter and will demonstrate the use of the induction coil.

Considerably over 3,000 new garments will be distributed among the various charitable institutions of Omaha Friday morning as a result of the annual collection of the local branch of the Needlework Guild of America. The collection was made at All Saints' church Thursday and Friday and consists largely of underclothing and bedding. About \$5 in cash was also received. The guild is un denominational and the distribution of garments will be entirely impartial. Besides the hospitals maintaining charity wards, the Douglas county detention school, Visiting Nurses association, St. James Orphanage, City Mission, Salvation Army Rescue Home, King's Daughters, Creche, Child Saving Institute, House of Hope, Old People's home and several special charities will be included in the distribution. Between 2 and 5 o'clock, the women of the guild held a reception in the parish house of All Saints' church that those interested might inspect the donations.

### QUARREL ENDS IN SHOOTING

Difference Over Ownership of Fish May Cost A. B. Duncan His Life.

As the continuation of an argument Thursday afternoon over the ownership of a few fish between A. B. Duncan and Frank Berry, two peddlars, Duncan is lying in a precarious condition at the Omaha General hospital with a bullet hole through his right lung, and Berry is under arrest at the police station on the charge of shooting with intent to kill.

From the story gleaned by the police it appears that Duncan, Berry and a few other peddlars were in a saloon at Sixteenth and Des Moines streets, and Duncan claimed ownership of a number of fish which Berry had in his possession. During the argument that followed it is claimed that Duncan grabbed the fish and threw them in the street. Berry objected and Duncan hit him in the face. Berry then left the saloon and was followed a short time afterward by the rest of the crowd. When the latter had reached the corner of Fourteenth and Chicago streets Berry again appeared and reopened the debate as to the ownership of the fish and during the renewed argument Duncan was shot

Rev. Henry Quickenden Preceded in Charge of Dundee Placed in Termination Church.

Rev. Henry Quickenden was installed Thursday evening as the new pastor of the Dundee Presbyterian church, succeeding Rev. Dr. T. K. Hunter, who resigned last summer to take charge of financial work for Bellevue college.
