DUN'S REVIEW OF TRADE

Improvement in Money Situation Facilitates Commercial Business.

MANY MILLS ARE STILL IDLE

Retail Trade is Well Maintained and Stocks of Cottons and Woollens Are Low—Collections More Prompt.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—B. O. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade tomorrow will say:

Further improvement in the financial situation is facilitating the return of normal commercial conditions, but there is still a great deal of idle machinery at mills and factories. In the leading industries a disposition is shown to defer production until there is no probability of cancellations and consumers show an inclination to place orders for forward deliveries. Retail trade is fairly well maintained, demand for holiday goods assuming seasonable proportions and collections are more prompt.

BRADSTREET'S REVIEW OF TRADE

Improvement is still Largely Confined to Financial Matters.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say:

Improvement is still largely confined to financial matters, notable in this respect being the increased ease of call money, some lifting of the embargo on time loans, advancing prices for both bonds and stocks, and a lowering of the currency premium after a sudden advance due to 'window dressing' necessities on the part of some banks. Accompanying these developments, however, has come an accentuation of the more confident feeling noted in general trade lines and in a few industries, further reinstatement of orders cancelled in a healthy way some time ago, some renewal of buying for quick shipment from jobbers and, where more seasonable weather has permitted, as in the northwest and south, some stimulation of the demand at retail for winter apparel and for holiday specialties. At best, however, trade as a whole is still very quiet and industrial activity is below the normal for this season of the year.

As a rule, although some producers have orders sufficient to operate full time, but there is still some fear of cancellations. The volume of new business is not so large as a year ago or last spring, one factor being the expectation of lower quotations. High grade footwear is not so strong in price, although some buyers claim that better shoes can be selected for the same money. Jobbers report a good demand for colored goods for next spring, especially Russia cloth and tan kid. Some of the most irregular. There is improvement in hides, tanners taking more interest in the further concessions in prices and there is less pressure to make sales by packers and dealers.
