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YATES ON POSTAL SAVINGS

Calls Them Class Legislation and Undesirable for Country.

NO LOANS ON REAL ESTATE

In Address Before Exchange He Declares National Banks Are Not Per Se Against the System.

"If the government establishes a system of postal savings banks in the United States you will never hear of a loan being made on real estate. The postal savings banks probably will get but 25 per cent of the savings of the country and will not have any money to loan for real estate business, while the government will not be able to make such loans as are now carried by the savings banks. The government will take no farm mortgages with the postal savings bank system and money redeposited will be only on the same condition that it is placed in depositories now."

This was the message which Henry W. Yates, president of the Nebraska National Bank, brought the Omaha Real Estate exchange when he addressed the members at the noonday lunch Wednesday.

"I am speaking against the postal savings bank, not as a banker, but as a business man," said Mr. Yates. "I want you to understand on the part that the national banks are turning down every day accounts which the postal banks would accept, so that the postal savings system could not in any way affect the national banks, except that it would be a detriment to business generally and drain the country of money."

Mr. Yates then gave a short address in three statements as to the conditions in other countries where the postal banks have been in operation, and declared that the state of Nebraska could pass laws which would make the establishment and maintenance of savings banks absolutely safe, and give the depositors twice as much for the use of their money, and loan the money on real estate and other approved securities, where it would be working in the interests of a community where it belongs and where it is hoarded in the United States treasury.

Still a Jeffersonian.

"I believe it is with the banking system the same as with other things. I am enough of a Jeffersonian democrat to believe that the states can still provide for themselves without looking to the federal government for everything. I would oppose any movement which would tend to the organization of a great national bank with branches distributed all over the country. It would be nothing short of a calamity, and I am of the belief that the states can provide for the organization of the savings institutions which we need today. If we cannot do this, it is no credit to our brains and judgment."

Real Estate Secured. "Of this enormous amount of money in our savings banks \$1,150,000,000 is loaned on real estate and I do not know of a better form of security for a savings bank than a good farm mortgage. The loans on bonds and securities amount to \$1,200,000,000. The average depositor has \$74.30 in the savings banks. The average depositor has \$24 and the average per capita of population is \$11.05."

Calls Them Class Legislation. Mr. Yates said postal savings banks were a sort of "class legislation" if they were to be established merely to accommodate that class of people who came to the country with some money and made a little more, and yet were so ignorant that they did not know when a private or corporation bank was safe. He said that those with working men's inclinations should be looking to state laws, which would give the working men banks, which would be safe and pay more interest on deposits, instead of looking to the national government to give them an institution, which would pay just half as much interest on their earnings and at the same time withdraw all the money from the channels of trade.

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LEASE FOR OLD QUARTERS

Commercial Club Takes Board of Trade for Another Year.

WILL BE WELL FITTED OUT

Rooms Occupied by Club Are to Be Newly Papered and Decorated and Hardwood Floors Put In.

By signing a lease for the present quarters in the Board of Trade building, the Commercial club has signified its intention of remaining in the building at least another year and as extensive improvements are being made in the rooms, the home of the club will probably remain where it is for a number of years.

All thoughts of moving to the Webster-Sunderland building, occupying the top floor of the Boston Store building or building a new home have been "passed up" for the present. But the rooms in the Board of Trade building are to be so arranged and decorated as to make the home of the club among the most attractive for the purposes of the club in the west.

Among the improvements will be a cafe for the women, which is to occupy the room formerly used for the office of the secretary of the Board of Trade. By removing partitions of the old cloak rooms, much more room will be given for a lobby and the flooring placed over the light shaft or "court" gives the club a large foyer, back of which will be located an information bureau, public telephones, cigar cases and other conveniences for members and the general public. The elevator is to be enclosed and by flooring over spare wasted in the stairway entrance a woman's retiring room and entrance to a woman's toilet will be arranged.

Rooms Newly Decorated. The rooms are being newly papered and finished throughout, while hard wood floors have been laid in the halls and lobby. These are to be stained and oriental rugs will cover the floors instead of the carpets. The dining room space will be enlarged by throwing open the space formerly occupied by a cafe which was used for men and women. Their reading rooms will remain the same with the exception of the new decorating and wall papering. All hangings and other articles of ornament and utility will be new.

Two new tables have been placed in the billiard room, one a large pool table and the other for billiards.

The advertising committee of the Commercial club is planning to issue at the end of the year a new booklet giving the statistics and other information about Omaha. The year of 1907 has shown such increases during the year as to make a favorable impression on Omaha wherever the booklets are distributed. During the year the committee has published two booklets which have been scattered from Omaha to the Pacific coast and mailed to all parts of the east. The trade excursion book was an elaborate publication while the second book was smaller and gave the statistics of 1906. The committee plans to have the new book out promptly after the first of the year.

H. T. CLARKE PLAN ADOPTED. Omaha Men Submit Resolution at Muskego Which is Generally Favored.

Henry T. Clarke, who has just returned from Washington, where he attended the meeting of the National Rivers and Harbors congress, has received certified copies of the resolutions which he introduced at the Transmississippi National congress, held in Muskego, Okla., previous to the meeting in Washington.

Mr. Clarke favored the issuance of United States 2 per cent bonds to do the necessary work on the rivers of the country, and proposed that since future generations would reap the benefit of the waterway improvements it was just that the work should be done with money secured from the sale of bonds. His resolutions were adopted.
