## TAFT LANDS IN NEW YORK

### Secretary of War Hastens On to Washington.

### JAPAN, HE SAYS, IS FOR PEACE

#### Island Nation Sees Nothing Hostile in Movement of Fleet—All Its Interests Lie in Retaining Friendship.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—Secretary of War Taft arrived here on the steamer President Grant, after a journey around the world. He was accompanied by Mrs. Taft and his son, Charles.

When seen on board at quarantine, Secretary Taft said he was not prepared to talk on any public questions.

He has been away from the United States 120 days and does not feel competent to discuss matters of American public interest at this time, said he. "Absence from home has prevented me from keeping abreast of current events. While the work in the War department has, of course, moved along in the usual way during my absence, there are many matters of large importance which require my personal attention, so I expect to have my nose close to the grindstone for some time to come."

The Tafts were taken off the steamer at quarantine by the government tug General Joseph Johnson.

Secretary Taft left for Washington at 1:14 p. m.

### Japan for Peace.

Secretary Taft was taken direct to Jersey City, where he took an afternoon Pennsylvania train for Washington. Questioned by a party of newspaper men, the secretary said that the departure of the Pacific fleet had not been discussed by the Japanese emperor and himself, but that the feeling in the island nation was that the maneuver was merely a test of the efficiency of the navy and was not to be construed as anything remotely akin to an unfriendly measure.

"The Japanese people are strongly in favor of peace," he went on. "I can speak with emphasis on this matter. Nothing but peace is to be expected. The trade relations between the two nations is a strong factor for pacification. Of Japan's yearly exports of \$100,000,000 over one-third comes to the United States. Most of their exports here are embroidery, laces and artistic goods of all kinds, and this trade means a livelihood to a great number of small traders on the island. If, therefore, we could make the body of the nation oppose any act of hostility."

Secretary Taft said the object of his trip was the inspection of the Philippines, and he had no mission to or message for any other nation. The only reason he returned by way of Siberia, he said, was that it saved one day in time.

One of the interviewers asked: "Who is your choice for president, Mr. Secretary?"

"Well," came the laughing reply, "I think I will have to leave that to inference." "The secretary is looking remarkably well."

### SETTLERS COMING TO WYOMING

Success of Dry Farming Induces Many to Take Up Homestead Claims.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—A county official here today announced a visit to the dry farming settlements in the vicinity of Cheyenne, and makes the astounding statement that during the last few months 729 settlers from this and other states have acquired either by homestead entry or by purchase, tracts of land and are arranging to farm the same. Additional tracts for grazing purposes also have been taken up. It is estimated that during the year no less than 1,200 farms have been taken up in the immediate vicinity of Cheyenne. Much of this was formerly sheep and cattle range, controlled by illegal fences, which President Roosevelt ordered down a year ago. This heavy influx of settlers to the dry farming country is an evidence of the benefits to the west through the president's fence removal order. Large tracts of deeded land, owned by cattle and sheepmen, were sold during the summer to eastern investment and colonization companies, which in turn cut up the big pastures into small tracts and sold to the settlers.

The county official says he counted 106 new dwellings and houses under construction on the farms of these settlers in the vicinity of the town of Luther alone.

### Work of Sheep Commissioners.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—The report of the State Board of Sheep Commissioners, just filed with Governor Brooks, shows that during the fiscal year just closed the board employed twenty-three inspectors in examining and quarantining and treating sheep on the ranges, for which nearly \$7,000 was expended in salary and traveling expenses. The board expended in office expenses, etc., \$3,000, making total expenditures of over \$10,000. During the same period the board collected in inspection fees about \$11,500.

During the year 1917, 273,800 sheep and bucks imported to the state were dipped once and 25,045 sheep and bucks found exposed on the ranges were dipped once, making a total of 312,644 sheep and bucks put through the vats once.

Diseased sheep were dipped twice, as follows: Sheridan county, 33,273; Crook county, 45; Big Horn county, 53; Laramie county, 42,304; Sweetwater county, 262; total, 32,990, or 107,560 dippings of diseased sheep, and a grand total of 486,311 dippings during the year. As the dipping cost approximately 25 cents, it will be seen that the importers and resident sheepmen expended \$18,252.75 in treating their sheep during the year.

### Jury in Carlson Murder Case.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—A jury has been secured in the Carlson murder trial. Two hundred and seventy-four talesmen were examined. The jury that will hear the evidence is as follows: W. L. Ayres and Joseph Merritts, Wheatland; F. L. Johnson, Crook; Timothy Williams, M. L. House, C. H. Litch, Thomas Hughes, Charles Thompson, Jacob Sherman and A. Christensen of Cheyenne; and Soren Tensen of Granite Canon. Carlson is charged with shooting his wife dead during a quarrel over who should use the family horse and buggy. Carlson is the wife and children. The crime was a cold-blooded one, and Carlson, after admitting that the killing was not justifiable and after attempting suicide once, suddenly changed his mind and now says his wife attacked him with a hammer.

### Rancher Loses Horses.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—The shooting and killing of several horses belonging to Ole Kettison, a well known rancher residing in the western portion of Lyman county, has caused a renewal of the warfare between the stockmen and homesteaders of that region. It is claimed by Kettison that he makes a practice of keeping his horses inside a fence so they cannot trespass upon the land of adjoining

homesteaders, and that the shooting and killing of his horses was a purely malicious act. Efforts now are being made to ascertain the identity of the person or persons who did the shooting so they can be arrested and prosecuted.

### Editor Sues for Damages.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—Following his recent acquittal in the state circuit court of the charge of criminal libel, preferred by Mayor Pillsbury of this city, Mark Scott, editor of the Sioux Falls Journal, a local weekly, has instituted a damage suit against the mayor. Editor Scott alleges in his complaint that the charge of criminal libel made against him by Mayor Pillsbury injured his good name and reputation, and he demands that he be awarded damages in the sum of \$5,000 for the injury done him by the mayor.

### Illegal Sale of Liquor Charged.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—The United States authorities in this city have been advised that as the result of the preliminary hearing of Roy Austin and Charles Le Clair of Alexandria, who were arrested a few days ago by Deputy United States Marshal John B. Petrie on the charge of selling liquor without having paid the special government tax, both defendants were held for appearance before a United States grand jury, which will convene in Sioux Falls next April.

### Mrs. Forgrave Out of Jail.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—A Sioux Falls bonding company has furnished a bond in the sum of \$2,000 for the release of Mrs. Irene Forgrave, who was arrested in Gregory county some weeks ago on the charge of shooting her husband with intent to kill, and accordingly she has been released from custody pending her trial at the April term of state circuit court in Gregory county.

### BRYAN WAITING AT THE CHURCH

Nebraska Tells Kansas City Newspapers He is Ready When Call Comes.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 20.—William J. Bryan, in this city today, when questioned as to democratic presidential possibilities and particularly as to the probability of Governor John A. Johnson of Minnesota, said in the course of an interview: "I know Governor Johnson personally, but you must pardon me for not going into personalities. I could not discuss him nor anyone else as a presidential possibility and be quoted without being misunderstood."

"I shall not volunteer as a democratic presidential candidate, but if I am drafted I will not desert."

Mr. Bryan, who is on a speech making tour that will take in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, arrived here this morning from Lincoln, Neb., on his way to Wichita, where he is to speak tonight.

### CAIN TO SUFFER FOR MURDER

Des. Moines Man Remains Let that Will Be His on Christmas.

DES MOINES, Ia., Dec. 20.—"Such a Christmas—sentenced to a life term of toil and misery behind the four walls of a prison! Away from home, away from children, shut out from everybody!" J. C. Cain, convicted of the murder of S. H. Morris, a wealthy mine owner, and sentenced to life imprisonment at Fort Madison, called at his fate in the convict's cage at the county jail today. He will be sentenced on Christmas evening unless the governor grants a motion for a new trial, which will be filed and argued at that time. Cain slew Morris because the latter sought to prevent him from illegally trafficking in liquor at the company's mines.

### CHICAGO BANK OFFICER GOES

Report that He Has Taken Sixty-Five Thousand Dollars from Private Institution.

CHICAGO, Dec. 20.—Richard Noelck, adopted son of August Seehn and cashier of the bank of the same name, owned by C. Bryn Mawr and Evanston venues, this city, has disappeared. The business of the bank was halted today, and Mr. Seehn is paying off depositors with checks on his personal account.

This bank had a capital of \$500,000 and a surplus of \$400,000. The deposits are \$200,000. Noelck had been separated from his wife for a month. He disappeared a week ago last Monday.

### CHOATE FAVORS GIVING TENTH

American Statesman Declares This Would Be a Great Help to the Nation.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—Joseph H. Choate, in an address at the annual meeting of the State Charities Aid association yesterday advocated adherence to the old Mosaic law that one-tenth of all property be given to charity. He said he did not believe many of the rich women and men who composed his audience had lived up to that law and that if all the people of the country had done so there would not have been any financial troubles like those through which the country has just passed.

### JOHN MITCHELL TAKEN ILL

Miners' Leader Compelled to Leave Labor Conference—In Series.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 20.—John Mitchell, president of the United Mine Workers of America, was taken seriously ill today while attending a joint conference of miners and coal operators at the Claypool hotel. He was taken to a room containing a nurse in order to receive medical attention. He is a Roman Catholic priest and a physician was summoned. The latter, after an examination, pronounced Mr. Mitchell in a serious though not necessarily critical condition.

### TELEGRAPH COMPANIES WIN

Order Looking to Test of Big Organizations as Trusts Voted in New York.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—A motion made by the Western Union and Postal telegraph companies to vacate an order obtained last June by Attorney General Jackson looking to the commencement of a suit to dissolve these companies was granted by the supreme court today. The attorney general intended to commence suit on the ground that the two companies had entered into an agreement in restraint of trade.

## BRUTAL CRIME OF A NEGRO

### Assault on Woman in Columbus, O., Residence District.

### MOB FORMS TO LYNCH FIEND

Traff Taken Up and Race Results Between Police and Citizens Who Are Bent Upon Vengeance.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 20.—Men on foot, in buggies and automobiles and on horseback are after an unknown negro, who today assaulted young Mrs. W. B. C. Hershey, wife of the president of the Excelsior Seat company. The crime was committed in the basement of her home on West Sixth avenue, and mounted policemen are after the culprit in hope that they will be able to get him before determined neighbors run him down.

Mrs. Hershey is still partly unconscious. She was alone in the house and, hearing something in the basement, she went down to investigate. As she stepped in she was seized and thrown violently to the floor by the negro, who stuffed a rag in her mouth and then deliberately took off her shoes. He remained with the half-conscious woman for some time and left her more dead than alive. Sneaking out of the base-

ment, the negro walked some distance, put on his shoes and disappeared. Some of the neighbors, suspicious at his actions, found Mrs. Hershey lying in the cellar bleeding from blows on face and body.

The indignation is so intense and widespread that the authorities fear if the posse catches the negro nothing will prevent a lynching.

A patrol wagon full of officers has been sent to the scene, as the excitement is spreading all over the north side.

### BRADSTREET'S REVIEW OF TRADE

Holiday Business Holds Center of the Stage.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say:

Holiday buying has had the center of the attention of wholesalers during the fall months as well as many concerns short of supplies, so that conservatism deferring the early replenishment of broken assortments. Prices are lower than last spring, but the balance of the year and winter report more encouraging news. Better inquiry for leather confirms the belief extant by tanners that shoe manufacturers, belt makers and other large consumers have lower stocks on hand than at any recent date. But prices are still on a higher basis than hide values, which accounts for the reluctance of leather consumers to provide for further needs.
