SEED CORN PRICE GOES UP

Jumps Since Contracts Are Made to Supply Trade.

DEALERS CAUGHT IN THE PINCH

Merchants Say They Cannot Force the Farmers to Let Go of Their Product at the Contract Figures.

Because the price of seed corn has advanced from 5 to 10 cents per bushel since contracts were made by growers with the seed houses, some trouble will be experienced by the seed corn dealers in securing the corn contracted.

The commercial corn price has advanced 5 to 7 cents since June. Seed corn usually sells for 5 to 8 cents more than the commercial grain, owing to the test.
