The commission gave the express companies until tomorrow to file complete annual reports. Unless this is done the commission will instruct the attorney general to bring suit against all express companies that are delinquent.

Adjutant General Charles F. Schwarz today issued an order mustering out Battery A, at Wymore, and providing for its reorganization as an infantry company, to be designated First separate infantry company and assigned to the Second battalion of the First regiment, Nebraska National Guard.

Board of Health Reports.

The report of the Board of Secretaries of the State Board of Health was filed with the governor this morning by Secretary Sward. It shows the births and deaths, by counties, for the year, the diseases which caused deaths, a financial statement and recommendations for a tuberculosis hospital and a larger appropriation for use in gathering vital statistics and for a central disease germ testing station.

Following the report of birth: Number of births reported for the year, 15,770; number of males, 8,034; number of females, 7,736; whites, 13,712; colored, 58; white males, 7,083; white females, 6,929; colored males, 21; colored females, 27; twin births (pair), 144; white twin births, 142; colored twins, 1; white males in twin births, 140; white females, 138; colored males, 2; colored females, 2; triplets (all white), 4; males in triplet births, 6; females, 6; two sets of the triplets, male, 2; female, 1; two sets of the triplets, male, 1; female, 1. Since October Secretary Sward has been keeping the birth record by counties as well as months and his new book will show not only the number and color, but also the nationality of the parents. The death record is also being kept in the same way and the report shows by counties just what diseases have caused deaths. This part of the report has already been made public. The office of the secretary was formerly located at Beatrice, but since the legislature it has been moved to Lincoln. The report is the work of Dr. Brash, former secretary, and Dr. Sward, the present secretary.

Richardson Man for Taxt.

Representative Schubert of Richardson county was at the state house this morning filing corporation papers for a new bank in his town and incidentally paying his respects to the governor. Mr. Schubert is outspoken for the nomination of Secretary Taft and said he believed the secretary should get the vote of the Nebraska delegation.

"I would like to see the president re-elected," said Mr. Schubert, "but as there is no chance of that, inasmuch as he has declined the use of his name as a candidate, I believe the republicans of Nebraska are for Secretary Taft. He is a progressive republican with plenty of ability to keep up the policies now being carried out. I believe Richardson county is for Taft."

Receiver for Insurance Company.

After all sorts of negotiations had been made by the Nebraska Mercantile Mutual Fire Insurance company of Lincoln, Auditor Searle this evening filed a petition in the district court asking for a receiver. His petition alleges that the company is insolvent. An examination made December 26 shows that its liabilities amount to \$44,742.43 and the assets to \$37,528.53.

Old Army Comrade Story Brings Reward to One Man. BLAIR, Neb., Dec. 31.—(Special.)—A \$30,000 real estate deal to have been closed up here on last Friday evening. M. J. St. Clair, purporting to be from Bloomington, Ind., dropped into this city the first of the week and renewed his acquaintance with several friends who were put up with him for the night. He was accompanied by his wife and two children, and was the comrade of the same regiment with St. Clair. LAST BAR DOWN TO ESTATE

Kinsler Overruled in Attempt to Obstruct Creighton Will.

SISTERS HAD RIGHT TO WITHDRAW

Such is Decision of Judge Leslie in Removing Ultimate Obstacle to Settlement as Per Agreement.

County Judge Leslie Tuesday afternoon removed the last important obstacle to the winding up of the affairs of the Count Creighton estate by overruling the motion of Attorney J. C. Kinsler to strike the withdrawal of appearance filed Monday by the Little Sisters of the Poor. Judge Leslie held the order had a right to withdraw his petition of intervention and the fact its attorney claimed a lien on the bequest it renounced would not justify a continuance of the litigation when the litigants themselves did not wish it. He held that if Mr. Kinsler's attorney's lien is a valid one he can prosecute it in some other way than by continuing the litigation, which would tie up the whole estate.

DEATH RECORD.

Jean F. E. Guyot-Francoise. PARIS, Dec. 31.—Jean Francoise Edmond Guyot-Francoise, the French minister of justice, dropped dead of apoplexy during this morning's session of the senate. Mr. Guyot-Francoise was born in 1852. He entered the public service in 1882, in 1887 he was elected to the Chamber of Deputies and in 1892 was appointed minister of justice in the Floquet cabinet. His present tenure of office dates from October 22, 1926. He was a member of the Legion of Honor.
