NEW-ORMONDE RACE COURSE

Thirty-Two-Mile Track for the Autos Will Be Built.

RACING IS SCHEDULED FOR MARCH

Committee Announces Dates and Conditions for the Big Events that Will Be Held on Florida Track.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—Announcement has been made by the Automobile Club of America that the Ormond Beach race, in the early part of March, will be held on a thirty-two-mile course, made by constructing loops at each end of a sixteen-mile stretch of beach.

Long Races—Two hundred and eighty-eight miles (nine laps of thirty-two miles), for the Automobile Club of America cup, for strictly touring cars, to run under Vanderbilt cup race rules, with a maximum weight limit of 2,400 pounds.

Short Races—One-mile international record for the Sir Thomas Dunlop trophy, two-mile-minute race, record speed trials for one mile and one kilometer.

Robert Lee Morrell, chairman of the executive board of the automobile manufacturing industry, which is to conduct the international stock car race for the Briarcliff trophy on April 24, 1928, announces that all permits for the use of the course in Westchester county have been secured.

There is a possibility that a third big automobile event will be added at an early date to the two important race meets already arranged for the opening months of this year.

Timely Tips for Automobile Owners and Drivers. Boston's show will be held during the week of March 7 to 14.

Grande do Sul, Brazil, has granted concessions to several syndicates which will operate automobile tracks between cities not reached by railroads.

Automobile schools are conducted by branches of the American Automobile Association in nineteen cities of the United States, most of them with the co-operation of the local police.

The Automobile club of Springfield, Mass., has started a movement for the improvement of the automobile industry.

An Akron, O., firm, one of the largest rubber manufacturing concerns in the United States, has decided to complete with French tire makers on their own ground and has opened a branch office in Paris.

Because of the shortage of gasoline in India the Motor union of that country was forced to abandon its reliability trials.

There is a steadily increasing demand for second-hand touring cars from business men who remove the old bodies and replace them with those of express wagons or other vehicles for which they want to use them.

An appeal is being made by the American Automobile association to have retail dealers in every state to lend their support to the federal bill requiring uniform laws in the various states, which is before congress.

During 1927 Kansas City offered 35,415 square yards of its boulevards twice and 18,520 square yards of its streets.

A removable top for motor boats, built on the same principle as a buggy top, is a novelty, said to be made of a frame which can be folded, while certain buttons on the sides.

After working several years to perfect an invention for the use of acetylene gas as a motive power for automobiles, Dr. No. 1 sent his papers to the patent office.

At the recent show at Copenhagen there were thirty-four French exhibitors, twenty-five German, ten English, and ten American, to only four from the country building the show.

Not satisfied with the fact that the charges for registration of automobiles in Rhode Island are the highest in the country, Senator Frelinghuysen, for whom the state's motor vehicle law is named, now proposes a bill to reduce the rate to produce a revenue of \$200,000 a year.

Whereas the value of importations of the persistent French motor cars in New York is only one-third that of November a year ago, the importations of automobiles for the month of December increased 39 per cent.

Rhode Island is such a small state that motorists from other states who violate the laws generally manage to get across the border without being caught.

At present indications point to 1928 being a year of unusual activity in the history of the motor vehicle. On every side power-trucks and motor cars are being used for tours or shows and public interest is being stimulated to a greater extent than ever before.

Motorists of Racine county, Wis., will have better highways as the result of the county's action in purchasing three one-hundredths of a mill on all property for good roads purposes.

Many of the leading makers of Great Britain already have announced their intention of participating in the forthcoming Italian exhibition in the field of motor cars.

Almost all vehicles in Paris, even the horse-drawn cabs and coaches, have pneumatic tires. Steam or gasoline-driven power-trucks and motor cars, of every power, ranging from carrying sixty passengers or five tons of coal, to delivering milk, are being used in the city.

The automobile messenger service recently established in Racine county, Wis., is proving very successful. Customers desiring money or wishing to make a deposit, have only to telephone the bank and the machine is soon at hand with the necessary patrol.

It has been only a few years since glass wind shields were first placed on view in Madison Square garden, where they were introduced by the American Automobile Association.

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HAS FUN WITH CARNEGIE

Mark Twain Takes a Whack at Andy and His Spelling Reform.

After 20 or 40 members of the Engineers' club of New York had given over their voices and ears to sound and heard the praise of Andrew Carnegie, who gave them their million-dollar clubhouse on Fortieth street, Mark Twain looked it upon himself to relieve the monotony of the conference by a superfluity of laudation.

"Just looking at Mr. Carnegie's face. It is all wrinkling with Benignus innocence. You might think he had never committed a crime. But no look at his pessimistic simplified spelling. You can't any of you. Imagine what a crime that has been. Mr. Carnegie has brought destruction to the entire race. I know he didn't mean it to be a crime, but it was, just the same. He's got us all so we can't spell anything."

"The trouble with him is that he attacked the symptoms and not the cause of the disease. He ought to have gone to work on the alphabet. There's not a vowel in it with a definite value and not a consonant that can do anything."

"Look at the 'h' distributed all around. Benignus would have settled them once and for all, and instead of giving us an alphabet that we wouldn't have to spell with all instead of this present silly alphabet, which I fancy was invented by a drunken thief. Why, there isn't a man who doesn't have to throw out about 1,000 words a day when he writes his letters because he can't spell them. It's like trying to do a St. Vitus dance with wooden legs."

"Now, I'll tell there isn't a man here who can spell pterodactyl, not even the prisoner at the bar. I'd like to hear him try once—but not in public.
