

COADJUTOR IS NOW BISHOP

Rt. Rev. A. L. Williams Head of Episcopal Church in Nebraska.

SUCCESSION WITHOUT CEREMONY

Under Canons of the Church He Takes Up the Work Laid Down by the Late Bishop Worthington.

In view of the death of Bishop Worthington, Right Rev. A. L. Williams, coadjutor bishop of Nebraska, will succeed to the title of bishop under the law of the church.

What arrangements for the funeral of Bishop Worthington will be made are only problematical as the coadjutor has not been received as to the disposition of the body. Bishop Williams says the inference is that Mrs. Worthington will bring the body back to this country and he will be buried at Batavia, N. Y., where other members of his family have been buried.

Bishop Williams says he often heard the bishop express a desire to be laid to rest near the other members of his family. A statement was given out at the home of Bishop Williams, prepared by Father John Williams and other of the Episcopal clergymen of Omaha. After recounting the history of the bishop's early career and his election to the diocese of Nebraska, the statement says:

"Few bishops, if any, held a higher, truer conception of the duties of the office than he. Under the counsel and direction of Dr. Delafield, a distinguished specialist of New York City, he very reluctantly determined to retire from the active administration of his diocese. He asked for a coadjutor and the request was granted. He surrendered nearly all the administration of the diocese to his coadjutor, Bishop Williams, between whom and himself the happiest relations of mutual trust and confidence ever existed. No ripple of disagreement has ever arisen between them. Bishop Williams received this morning a letter from him, breathing affection and confidence in every line.

Succession of Coadjutor. "Under the canons of the church, Bishop Williams succeeds as bishop of the diocese without need of any other action on the part of the diocese or the church at large. Too little is known of the death of Bishop Worthington to determine when the body of the dead bishop is to arrive home or what action is to be taken by the diocese as to his burial. It is only known that he died suddenly at Montone, doubtless of the heart trouble which compelled him to retire from the active duties of his office. He will doubtless be buried in the family burying place at Batavia, N. Y.

"During the administration of Bishop Worthington many churches and rectories have been built in different towns of Nebraska. Among these are churches at Beatrice, Columbus, at a cost of \$40,000; Holy Trinity at Lincoln, costing \$50,000; Falls City, Fremont, All Saints, Good Shepherd, St. Johns, St. Andrews, St. Paul's, St. Philip the Deacon's, a gift from Mrs. Worthington; St. Matthias, a memorial from his own relatives and dear friends, all the above at Omaha, and churches at Albion, Auburn, Bancroft, Creighton, Crete, Dewitt, Florence, Geneva, Hartington, Harvard, Monroe, Norfolk, Norfolk, Papillion, three at South Omaha, Tecumseh, Wahoo, Wynore, Genoa, Plattsmouth, Tekamah. Brownell Hall stands practically a monument to his generosity and devotion, the plant being worth \$30,000. During the hard times of the late administration for the missionaries enabled the church to keep the missionaries in the field during those trying times.

NEBRASKA IN LYNCH ZONE

State Gets Into Class of Those that Hang Without Formality of Trial.

For the first time in a number of years Iowa and Nebraska appear in the list of states which have reported lynching during the year of 1907, the list having just been received in Omaha.

The Nebraska lynching was early in September when Loris Lelloy Higgins was hanged at Bancroft. The lynching in Iowa was at Charles City, when an insane farmer was hanged for killing his family. The new state of Oklahoma, a territory during 1907, enters the list of states reporting lynchings. Alabama jumped from five in 1906 to thirteen in 1907.

The offenses for which fifty-six human beings were forced to give up their lives during the year range from stealing 75 cents and talking to white girls over the telephone, to rape and murder of wife and son. Following is the comparative table of lynching for the two years:

Two members of the Cornell chapter of the fraternity, Mr. Stanton of New York City, Mr. Millard's room mate, and Mr. Goodspeed, came from Cornell to attend the funeral and act as pallbearers with Arthur Waskley, Charles L. Saunders, Dr. Harold Gifford and Ezra Millard. Except the members of the fraternity only members of the family were present. Interment was at Forest Lawn cemetery.
