Parents Sue for Boy's Death—Mary and Edward Fitzgerald, parents of Martin J. Fitzgerald, who was fatally crushed between the bumpers of two freight cars in the South Omaha yards October 18, have begun suit in district court against the Burlington road for \$2,100. The petition says he was insured in the relief department for that amount, but the road refused to pay it.  
Wants Children, But Not Wife—L. Quinn, 2215 Burt street, reported to the police Friday that his wife had left home with their two children after raising money by placing a mortgage on their household furniture. He says he wants the children back, but does not care whether his wife returns or not. He thinks she has gone to Lincoln and has notified the police there.  
Thirty Cents for Thief—Thirty-six cents was the reward obtained by a thief who broke into J. F. Bloom's head stone establishment Thursday night at 216 South Eighteenth street. That amount of money was taken from the safe, which had been left unlocked. Entrance was gained by breaking the glass in the door. This is the second time burglars have broken into this place within the last year.  
Columbo Will Fight the Case—Saevorio Colombo, the Italian charged with killing Joseph Florensia in East Omaha Sunday, will fight the case Saturday morning. Colombo was taken to the court room for arraignment Friday morning, but he demanded a hearing, so the case was put over for a day. He has employed an attorney and will fight the case at the preliminary hearing.  
Sutton and Sutcliffe Fall Out—Frank J. Sutton, who for two and a half years has been court reporter for Judge Sutton, has severed his connection with the courts and has opened an office in The Bee building. Sutcliffe says he was discharged for political reasons, while Judge Sutton says he quit of his own accord because the judge refused to appoint him for the term. Judge Sutton denied a published statement that he had appointed Sutcliffe with deplorable. He has not yet appointed a successor.  
Boyles College, selected by Union Pacific railroad as official training school for telegraphers. The Union Pacific has recently chosen Boyles college as a training school for telegraphers and installed into the school its train dispatcher's wire and furnished it with all necessary telegraph and station blanks for the mastery of station work. The railroad company has adopted this plan in order to help supply its demand for operators, and gives employment to all graduates of this department of Boyles college.  
Creditors Want Bankruptcy Declared—The creditors of Jan N. Voborit, a farmer of Howells, have filed a petition in the United States district court, asking he may be declared a bankrupt. Hearing petitioning creditors are May Bros of Fremont, M. Spiesberger & Son Co., and the King-Graham Manufacturing company of Omaha. The petition alleges that Voborit has already committed the act of bankruptcy by transferring certain of his property to other creditors with the purpose of hindering and defrauding the petitioners out of their lawful claims.

### ANDREWS TO STAY IN PLACE

Chancellor Denies He Will Tender Resignation from University of Nebraska.

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 10.—Chancellor E. Benjamin Andrews, of the University of Nebraska, this morning denied the rumor that he intended to resign.

“There is absolutely no truth in the report,” he said.

Chancellor Andrews was granted a leave of absence last summer. He took a European trip and returned greatly improved in health.

That E. Benjamin Andrews has not tendered his resignation as chancellor of the University of Nebraska, is the belief of C. J. Ernst, who was chairman of the Board of Regents until Thursday evening, when he was succeeded by C. H. Allen of Lincoln. Speaking of the resignation, Mr. Ernst said:

“Up to yesterday, when my term as recent and president of the board expired, no resignation had been received from Chancellor Andrews or even expected in the least by myself. Last spring, when a certain eminent physician in the east, whom Chancellor Andrews consulted, alarmed the chancellor concerning his physical condition, Dr. Andrews immediately took the Board of Regents into his confidence and declared his readiness to resign at once, but not a single member of the board was willing to consider any such immediate action, every one hoping and believing that a few months’ rest would no doubt prove very beneficial and might be all the chancellor was in need of and the board utterly rejected any idea of his tendering his resignation and gave him leave of absence until October 1, in order that he might take a trip to Europe, which he did. The chancellor returned, apparently in the best of health, and when I last saw him a week or ten days ago, he appeared to me as well as I have ever seen him since he has been connected with the university, and on my inquiry assured me that he was feeling very well indeed, and unless his resignation was tendered by him yesterday or today, to my successor, the temporary president of the board, I do not believe there is a word of truth in the report.”

### NEW TURN IN SUNDAY CASE

Man Denied Trial by Jury Claims He is Denied Constitutional Right.

The fight in the courts against the Sunday closing order took an entirely new turn Friday afternoon, when Isidor Ziegler filed a habeas corpus case in district court in behalf of William Key, proprietor of a pool hall on Capitol avenue, who was fined in police court for keeping his place open on Sunday. Before his trial in police court Key demanded a jury, but his request was denied. He now contends his constitutional

right to a trial by jury has been denied him and he wants to be released on that ground.

If the court sustains the right of a person charged with an offense in police court to a trial by jury, all offenders charged with violating the Sunday closing law will demand juries and it is believed public sentiment will prevent convictions.
