### HEPBURN HAS NEW RIVAL

Will Be Opposed by A. I. Smith on Waterway Platform.

TURN IN RIVER TRAFFIC BOOM

End of Navigation Dawdling, and Boosts Come from Governors, Mayors and Ambassadors of Foreign Countries.

That the country is entering up an era which will see the improvement of waterways and navigation of the Mississippi and Missouri rivers, seems certain from the letters received by promoters of the Missouri River Navigation Congress, copies of which have been forwarded to friends of the waterway movement in Omaha.

Albert I. Smith of Mount Airy, Ia. will contest the republican nomination for Congress in the eighth district with Colonel Fete Hephurn, mainly on a "waterways plank" which Mr. Smith has inserted in his platform, while Colonel Hephurn has failed to "warm up" to the waterways question.

Iowa congressmen assert that the air is full of the unprecipitated vapor of transportation matters and the related topic of waterways and waterway improvement.

### BILLS OF LADING FOR CANS

Steps Taken by Creamery Companies Against Express Corporations.

Attempts of the express companies to extort the existence of the yellow and red train creamery cans by throwing them heartily on pavements and throwing them from baggage car door at way stations, water tanks and small towns, will be enjoined if the Fairmont Creamery company of Omaha can secure an order from the Interstate Commerce Commission compelling the express companies to issue bills of lading for the empty cans.

A petition has been filed by the Fairmont Creamery company against the Pacific Express company alleging the refusal of the carrier to issue bills of lading covering the free return of empty cans. A letter from the commission to the company states that the Interstate Commerce commission believes that since the rate on cream includes the return of the empty cans free of charge, the bills of lading cover the empties and the carrier may be held responsible for the destruction or loss of the cans.

After reading the letter all the express companies have agreed that the bills of lading cover the empties, except the Pacific and American Express companies. They have been paying for some time the claims of the companies for

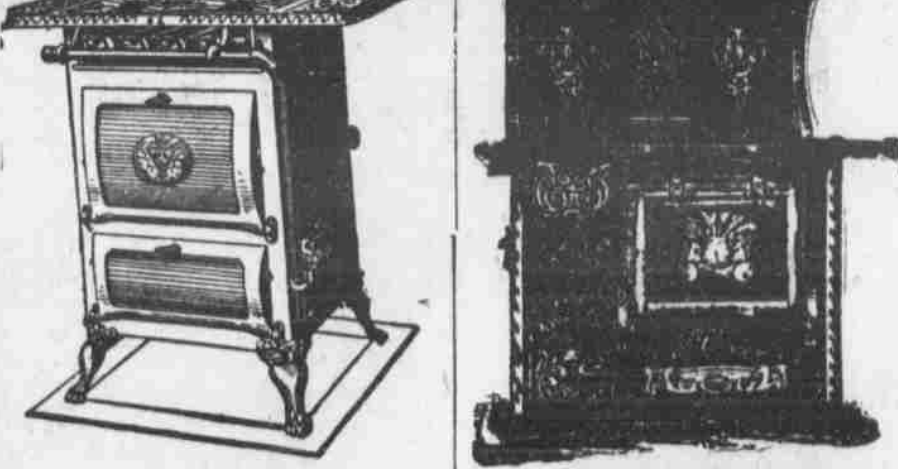
