tive of a number of the large companies. received notice Saturday that loans would he resumed and it is predicted that mortgage money will be as easy as during the summer of last year, when large amounts money were loaned in Omaha by the surance companies.

The announcement is important to real state dealers of Omaha, as many deals ave been held up because of the impossibillty of the mortgage money market. One building and loan association of Omaha has given notice that loans will be resumed, and during the last week has loaned \$80,600 in small amounts on Omaha property.

Others Will Follow. cather companies probably will resume mans about the time the insurance companies enter the market for the business. One company has money contracted for so far ahead, that it will not make new loans until the middle of March. At the time file "Md" went on the banks October 27, this company had \$225,000 promised to Solders, and the sum has not been easy to get, but no building has been retarded as the company has been able to supply the cash as fast as it was needed to pay workmen and buy material, but it could not have been all furnished at once.
