> METEOR IS VISIBLE Phenomenon Makes Its Appearance Early in the Evening Where Omahans Can See It.

> About 7 o'clock Monday evening a large meteor put in its appearance about a degree east of the zenith in close proximity o the Pleiades and descended slowly toward the southeast, exploding about three degrees above the southeastern horizon. The celestial visitor was one of the largest ever seen in this latitude. Its color was of a bluish tint and was marvelously briltant. It was visible at least twenty seconds from its first appearance until its explosion and when exploding it very much resembled a colossal skyrocket. In its passage across the firmament it left a distinct trail of white light which lingered for a second or two after its explosion.


