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DYNAMITE RUINS IOWA TOWN

Mining Hamlet of Hocking, Near Albia, Suffers from Explosion.

FIRE STARTS IN STORE ON TRACK

Five Hundred Pounds of Explosive in Box Car Does Damage—Five Men Are Injured.

DES MOINES, Jan. 25.—Five hundred pounds of dynamite in a box car at the mining town of Hocking, two miles from Albia, exploded during a fire which started in the company store at 1 o'clock this morning and five men were injured and \$20,000 worth of property destroyed.

The fire started from an unknown cause in the company store of the Hocking Supply company, a frame building containing a stock worth \$20,000. On a sidetrack near by was a string of box cars, one containing 500 pounds of dynamite. The flames jumped to the cars and when the dynamite was reached it exploded with a deafening roar.

The cars were demolished and the trucks and rails were driven into the ground for four feet. Flying pieces of timbers struck the people in the crowd and the concussion knocked all of them down. Chimneys were knocked from twenty-five houses, plastering and picture glass were blown down and all the windows in town broken. It was then that the men were injured.

Another string of box cars stood on a siding one hundred feet away and these were demolished with their contents. The shock knocked down a stove in the restaurant of F. P. Gordon, a saloon and a cage caught fire from the stove. This building with the contents was partially destroyed. Next door the barber shop of Joe Townsend was demolished.

The brave miners fought the flames, even when they knew the dynamite was in the car next to the one in which it was likely to explode at any time.
