LISBON, Feb. 3.-Portugal today saw the establishment of a new regime. Premier Franco has resigned office, and within forty-eight hours of the assassination of King Carlos his dictatorship is at an end, least for the present. Franco resigned for fear that his continuance in office would plunge the country into rebellion. The premier has been considered directly responsible for the political turmoil, which resulted in the assassination of the king, and his withdrawal from power is regarded as holding a promise of political tran-A new cabinet has been formed under

the presidency of Rear Admiral Do Amaral, a member of the propressist-dissident party. Some of the new ministers have n netably opposed to the rule of Franco, but on the whole the present cabinet is liberal, with monarchial tendencies. The opening session of the new council

was held today and the young monarch, King Manuel II. placed himself in the hands of his ministers. He appeared before them and in a voice shaking with "I am yet without experience in science

Boycott in Restraint of Trade. The opinion of the court was unanimous Chief Justice Fuller sadi:

In our opinion the combination described in the declaration is a combination concrete in the declaration is a combination "in restraint of trade or commerce among the several states" in the sense in which those words are used in the act and the action can be maintained accordingly, and that conclusion rests on many judgments of this court, to the effect that the act probabilities are combination whetever to see

conclusion rests on many judgments of this court, to the effect that the act prohibits any combination whatever to secure action which essentially obstructs the free flow of commerce between the states, or restricts, in that regard, the liberty of a trade to engage in business.

The combination charged falls within the class of restraints of trade almed at compelling third parties and strangers involuntarily not to engage in the course of trade except on conditions that the combination imposes, and there is no doubt that, to quote from the well known work of Chief Justice Erie on trade unions, in common law every person has individually, and the public line also collectively, a right to require that the course of trade should be kept free from unreasonable obstruction. But the objection here is to the jurisdiction, because, even conceding that the declaration states the case good at common law, it is contended that it does not state one within the statute. Thus it is said that the restraint alleged would operate to entirely destroy the defendants business and thereby include intrastate trade as well: that physical obstruction is not alleged or contemplated; and the defendants are not thomselves engaged in intrastate trade. fendants are not themselves engaged in intrastate trade.

We find none of the objections are ten-able, and that they are disposed of by previous decisions of this court.

History of the Case.

The suit was instituted by Loewe & Co. by a boycott against their factory to the extent of \$80,000, asked for a judgment for \$240,000 in accordance with the terms of the Sherman act. Norris' Hand in Pension Bill. Judge Norris of the Fifth district receixed the congratulation of many of his colleague on the floor of the house today for having written into the widows' pension bill, which passed that body today, much of its provisions and much of its verbiage. The bill which passed the house today gives to widows of soldiers or sailors who served in the civil war, the war with Mexico and Indian wars \$12 per month providing said widow was married to said soldier or sailor prior to June, 1890. It repeals former acts relative to proof that such soldier or sailor died of wounds contracted during the said wars and doca away with the proposition that the widow must prove that her income is not more than \$250 per year. The act does not in any way reduce any pension under any act, public or private, but gives the widow outright upon due proof of her husband's death, said husband having served in the army or navy in the wars above men tioned, \$12 per month.
