ECONOMY AT COUNTY JAIL

New Method of Feeding Prisoners Saves Money to Taxpayers.

FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS A MONTH

IF AVERAGE FOR JANUARY IS MAINTAINED A SAVING OF SIX THOUSAND WILL ACCRUE BY THE END OF YEAR.

The new method of feeding prisoners at the county jail is saving money for Douglas county at the rate of \$500 a month. This was disclosed Tuesday, when Elias Wright, the contractor, filed his bill for the period beginning January 1, when he began feeding the prisoners, to February 1.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—The advances received by the British from Lisbon confirm the reports that there has been nothing, either in the city or in the country, to create further disorders.

The Portuguese legation this morning received a telegram from the Foreign office at Lisbon saying that King Manuel is recovering from the injury sustained at the time his father and brother were killed.

The minister of war issued a statement today declaring the rumors that a revolution had broken out in Oporto or elsewhere in the country to be absolutely untrue.

PARIS, Feb. 4.—The Petit Parisien declares today that on Saturday night, at a meeting of the council of state in Lisbon, Premier Franco guaranteed to restore order if he was given full power and allowed to deport any prisoners.
