HARRIMAN MEETS HILL CUT

Union Pacific Reduces Through Passenger Rates to Northwest

EFFECTIVE ON THE FIFTEENTH

General Passenger Agent Lomas Announces Rates Same as Those Over Great Northern and Northern Pacific

Some time ago the Hill lines from St. Paul to the Pacific Northwest reduced the through passenger rates, because of some local reductions caused by the 3-cent law in Minnesota and the 2-cent law in North Dakota.

February 15 the Union Pacific Railroad company will reduce its first-class limited rates to northwestern points to the same figures as used by Northern lines from St. Paul, thus placing all Missouri river routes on a parity with the rates from St. Paul by the Hill lines.

Built Against Encroachment Structures Made by Michael Will Be No Joke.

April first jokes that will not contain much substance of a job will be perpetrated on the owners of between 100 and 200 buildings in the business section of the city of Omaha on the first day of April by Charles H. Withers, city building inspector.

ORDER TO DESTROY FENCES

Ruling Made by Judge Manger Wiping Out Enclosures to Land.

Judge W. R. Manger has handed down two decrees in the United States district court in land fencing cases, wherein the defendants are directed to remove the fences illegally placed on public lands, enclosing them from having any claim to lands so illegally fenced and to pay all costs in the cases by a decree.

The first case is that of the United States against Albert Metzger, John Hester, Jonathan F. Young and Bishop & Young shortly after this suit was filed against all their fences and the United States is entitled to a decree.

The second case is that of the United States against James H. Quigley for illegal fencing of public lands in Cherry county and directing the immediate removal of such fences. In the event of failure to do so the United States marshal is directed to remove the fences, destroy the same and that the costs thereof shall be assessed against the defendant.
