KANSAS CITY BOOSTS OMAHA
Publishes Map that Shows Nebraska Metropolis Greatest Center.
NEARER MORE THAN KAWTOWN
Claiming the Earth Itself, the Missouri City's Map Shows Omaha Next to the Heart of Most Industries.
Omaha boosted by Kansas City! Few cities have ever been given such a good boost by a competitor as Omaha is receiving with the compliments of the business men of Kansas City, according to Commissioner J. M. Guild of the Omaha Commercial Club.
Seeking to advertise Kawtown, the Merchants' and Manufacturers' association of Kansas City has prepared a map of the United States, bending up the steel railroad rails a little to make them radiate from Kansas City and showing the centers of production, population and industry.
To the surprise of the Omaha Commercial Club the map which is being published in the magazines at an enormous expense to Kansas City, shows plainly that Omaha is nearer the center of production for many commodities than Kansas City. In some instances the advantage of Omaha being given by several hundred miles.
According to the Kansas City map Omaha has the advantage of any other city in the west, in being close to the supply of the following products:
Copper, Wool, Gold, Wheat, Silver, Catfish, Hides, and many other commodities.

ing items than any other city on the Missouri river:
Lead and Zinc, Cattle, Cotton, Horses and Mules, "Farm Products."
Center of Population.
Kawtown also boasts of being nearer the center of population in the United States, an imaginary point in Indiana and also nearer the geographical center of the United States, a surveyor's joke, always in dispute, but claimed to be an imaginary point in northern Kansas, some place "in the rich Republican river valley."
The centers of the great region producing corn and hogs are equidistant from Omaha and Kansas City, while according to the Kawtown map the center of cattle production in the United States is in southwestern Iowa, nearer Kansas City than Omaha.
"What are you going to do in return for the advertising Kansas City is giving Omaha?" the commissioner was asked.
"I think we better take the matter up with our advertising committee," suggested Mr. Guild.
"Will you publish a few hundred maps, showing Omaha with a red star, under the title 'What Our Neighbors Say About Us?'"
"We will consider such a proposition, but the map is being given a wide circulation by Kansas City and there is little need for us to go to the expense."
BUTCHER PROFITS BY FAULT
Frank Kuncel is Discharged as Result of Carelessness on Part of Official.
Because the state chemist and state meat inspector were careless in complying with the provisions of the statute regarding conviction of persons under the pure food law Frank Kuncel, 1207 South Sixth street,

was discharged by Police Judge Crawford Saturday morning. Kuncel was charged with selling hamburger sausage adulterated with sulphites. But his attorney showed that the jar in which one of the samples was kept was not properly sealed and that it was even broken so that it would have been possible to insert sulphites upon the meat after it was put in the jar. Also the attorney pointed out that this sample for the use of the defendant had not been kept in the custody of the state chemist in the state laboratory of the Pure Food and Dairy commission as provided by the statute.
Two other cases are pending of the same charge against Omaha butchers.

WILLIS CURL AN EX-CONVICT
Negro Finally Identified by Chief of Detectives Savage.
SERVES EIGHT YEARS AT LINCOLN
Guilty of Many Burglaries and Attack of Miss Poast, but His Imprisonment Clears Him of Rummelhart Murder.
Chief of Detectives Savage has succeeded in identifying Willis Curl, the negro who confessed to knocking down and robbing Miss Florence Poast the evening of January 26 at Twenty-second and California and to having committed at least five burglaries in Omaha. Curl was sentenced to eight years in the penitentiary for the district court of Douglas county in 1900 for burglary.
His sentence, with deductions for good behavior, expired last fall and he was discharged. Since then he has been living in Omaha and engaging in burglary and highway robbery, his operations culminating with the assault of the young woman from whom he stole a handbag after knocking her down with a cold chisel.
Chief Savage thought he recognized Curl when he was first arrested Saturday he "came to him." Chief Savage secured the photograph of Curl from the rogues' gallery and there he is described as "Bill Corey, alias Curl." He wore a mustache at that time. He is now smooth-faced.
This identification, however, effectually proves an alibi for Curl in the matter of the murder of Miss Rummelhart, the night of October 6, 1906, of which he was sus-

pected, as he was in the penitentiary then. Curl will be swiftly guided to the penitentiary at the earliest moment as he is anxious to plead guilty to a few burglaries in order to escape a mob which he believes is after him for some of his highway robberies.
ONE HUNDRED LEAVE ARMY
Men Recruited in Georgia Will Be Discharged from Service Next Week.
About 100 of the enlisted men of the Sixteenth infantry at Fort Crook will be discharged from the army by reason of expiration of enlistment next week. This group of men was enlisted three years ago while the regiment was stationed at Fort McPherson, Georgia, and their terms of enlistment expire at the same time.
The new roster of the Department of the Missouri has just been issued. It shows that serving in the department are one battalion of engineers, three companies of the signal corps, seven regiments of cavalry, the Second, Fourth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, one troop of the Tenth and one squadron of the Thirteenth; two regiments of artillery and four regiments of infantry, the Eleventh, Thirteenth, Sixteenth and Nineteenth.
Lieutenant Colonel Charles M. O'Connor and Veterinary Surgeon R. J. Stancil of the Eighth cavalry at Fort Robinson have been ordered to go to Diamond, Wyo., to purchase in open market eighty horses for the Eighth cavalry.
These general court martial sentences have been approved by headquarters, Department of the Missouri: Privates Oscar Miller, Battery F, Second field artillery,

for desertion, eighteen months' imprisonment; James W. Reddon, Battery E, Sixth field artillery, for larceny, one year's imprisonment; William Dierkes, Troop K, Seventh cavalry, for drunkenness on duty and absence without leave, six months' imprisonment; Edward McEvoy, Company C, Thirtieth infantry, drunkenness on duty and absence without leave, six months' imprisonment; Willie M. Drake, Company E, Thirtieth infantry, for absence without leave, three months' imprisonment; William A. Willard, Troop C, Sixth cavalry, for desertion, nine months' imprisonment. All the sentences carry with them dishonorable discharge from the army. All terms of imprisonment will be served at Fort Leavenworth military prison.
A general court-martial has been ordered to convene at Fort Des Moines, February 10, with the detail: Lieutenant Colonel L. P. Hunt, Captains John P. Wade, S. A. Purviance, First Lieutenants Henry W. Parker, Walter F. Martin, Frank E. Sidman, Second Lieutenants William R. Pope, Moss L. Love, James A. Mars and First Lieutenant Edgar N. Coffey, judge advocate, all of the Second cavalry.

CALLAHAN CASE BOBS UP
Demurrer Filed by Attorney of Grave Yard Superintendent Attacking Validity of Charge.
After slumbering for a year, the criminal charge against Daniel C. Callahan, superintendent of Prospect Hill cemetery, bobbed up before Judge Sears Saturday morning, when Frank L. Weaver, Callahan's attorney, filed a demurrer to the several informations. Callahan was charged in each information with aiding James C. Clark in disintering the body of an unknown person without the consent of the

near relatives of the deceased person. In his demurrer Attorney Weaver contends the omission of the names of the dead person is fatal, as it is necessary for the state to prove the disinterment was done without the consent of the relatives. In order to do this the identity of the body disinterred, he contends, must be known. As there is no way to identify the body, he declares the criminal charges are null. Judge Sears will decide the demurrer some time next week.
