Spending Billion Dollars.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 10.-Representatives of the Russian admiralty submitted today to the commission of national defense of the Duma the financial outline of the much-discussed naval program. The program is to be completed in 1917 and includes not only the construction of a fleet of battleships, but also a certain amount of hydrographic work at several of the ports of Russia.
