GOVERNMENT OWES THE SIOUX. Supreme Court Holds Over Seven Months Thousands Due.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—In an opinion by Justice Holmes the supreme court of the United States today decided the case of the Sisseton and Wahpeton bands of Sioux Indians against the United States favorably to the Indians.

MOTED BANK CASE DECIDED. Bank President's Note Taken Up by Funds of His Bank.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Justice Holmes today delivered the opinion of the supreme court of the United States in the case of Charles T. C. Ferry, receiver of the bankrupt Capital National bank of Oklahoma, against the City National Bank of Kansas City, Mo., involving the question whether the funds of one bank, when deposited in another can be appropriated to pay the notes of the president of the depositing bank.

TIMBER ON INDIAN LANDS. Supreme Court Says Interior Department Can Regulate Its Sale.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—In the case of A. G. Starr against S. W. Campbell, involving the right of the interior department to regulate the disposal of timber on the land of the Indians on the LaPointe reservation in Wisconsin, the court sustained the supreme court of the United States today held that a provision in a patent to land granted to an Indian prohibiting him from alienating his land also was applicable to the alienation of timber on the land.

CONSTRUCTION OF COPYRIGHT. Mechanical Players May Use Music as May Be Desired.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—In an opinion by Justice Day the supreme court of the United States today decided the case of the White-Smith Music Publishing company of Massachusetts versus the Apollo company, a New Jersey corporation, involving the question whether reproduction on perforated paper for use in pianolas and similar instruments, in favor of the Apollo company.

DOMESTIC CREDITOR PREFERRED. Wisconsin Case Decided Bringing Up International Question.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—In the case of the Berlin Banking corporation, known as the Disconto Gesellschaft, against Augustus C. Umbreit, decided by the supreme court of the United States today favorably to Umbreit, was involved the international question as to whether a domestic creditor should be given preference over a foreign creditor in the American courts.

LABOR TO CONTINUE FIGHTING. President Gompers Declares Unions Will Not Be Driven Out.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, before the house committee on the Judiciary today asserted that labor organizations are not going to be "driven out of existence" notwithstanding adverse decisions rendered by the courts.
