## BALKAN SITUATION

British Foreign Minister Fears it Will Break Concert of Powers.

AFFAIR AT CRITICAL STAGE

Lords and Commons Informed that Diplomatic Tension Makes Outlook Anything But Cheerful.

LONDON, Feb. 26 .- The Macedonian difficulty is in both houses of Parliament night. Bir Edward Grey, secretary for foreign affairs, made a statement in the ner. Lords, the gist of both statements being that because of the porte's obduracy, matgovernment deprecated any isolated action, but was doing its utmost to preserve the concert of powers and press Turkey to an acceptance of the reforms.

Sir Edward Grey said that in discussing the Macedonian question the government was not far from the Turkish question, which more than once had led to a European war. They were rapidly nearing a If the concert disapproved it was impossible to foretell what misunderstandings might arise. If Macedonia continued to be neglected, he added, as a note of warning, it must sooner or later provoke a catastrophe

Sir Edward suggested that if a Turkish governor were appointed for a term of years and he was a man whose capacity and character were recognized and accepted by the powers, the whole question might be solved.

Lord Fitzmaurice, who promised that the government shortly would make suggestions that it considered necessary to meet the existing situation, said that he regretted that he had no cheerful news to impart for the present. A very critical stage had been reached, he said, in both the local affairs of Macedonia and in the diplomatic entente known as the concert of Europe. The attitude of Turkey gave cause for great anxiety and the foreign office felt it necessary to ask themselves whether the time had arrived to appoint Christian governor of Macedonia

With regard to the Austrian project for the construction of a branch railroad line through Turkish territory, to connect reaty of Berlin gave Austria the right to occupy and bulld such a road.

In conclusion he added that the bright spot in the situation was that the powers displayed less readiness than formerly to minimize the dangers of the Macedonian
