

DEADLOCK IS BROKEN

Former Governor Bradley Elected Senator from Kentucky.

FOUR DEMOCRATS V FOR HIM

Former Governor Beckh. Supporters of Plet.

WILD EXCITEMENT ON OR

Efforts Made to Get Democrats to Change from Bradley.

CONTEST LASTS SIX WEEKS

Mr. Bryan Says He Regards Choice of Mr. Bradley as a Great Misfortune to the Country.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 28.—Former Governor William O. Bradley was today declared elected to the United States senate after an exciting joint sitting of the general assembly, receiving four democratic votes in addition to the votes of all republicans present.

It had been held from the beginning of the contest over six weeks ago, that a majority of the quorum was sufficient for an election, and with 138 members present today it required sixty-four votes to elect. The votes of four democrats, who have steadily refused to vote for former Governor Beckham, were transferred today from the various democrats on whom they had sought to induce their party associates to unite, to the republican caucus nominee and his election promptly followed.

The many changes of votes made in the recapitulation a very slow process and it also developed an additional vote, but the vote for Bradley remained unchanged, still being a majority of all members present and voting. There was some further delay in the announcement, but the speaker finally announced that Bradley had received a majority of the votes and was elected.

Much Excitement During Vote.

On the information that the vote in joint session today former Governor Bradley, republicans, seemed to have been elected to the United States senate, having received 67 votes, to 69 for Beckham, 1 for Allen and 1 for Blackburn.

The democrats at once left the hall in an attempt to break the quorum, but later returned and the vote was ordered verified. Four democrats joined with the sixty republicans who today voted for Bradley and they announced that they would not change their votes on any roll call, which would seem to indicate the certainty of the election of Bradley.

Bradley received the votes of four democrats, three from Louisville, Senators McHugh and Representative Lillard of Bowling Green, the number necessary to elect a senator of the widest excitement prevailed in the capital. It was announced that the democrats demanding a recapitulation, Beckham came on the floor of the house chamber and released the democrats from their primary nomination pledge.

Many democrats jumped to their feet and sought to change their votes, the majority being for Congressman James. A strong effort was made to induce the four republicans to leave Bradley and vote for some democrat.

The announcement that Bradley had been elected was made after nearly all the democrats had changed their votes. The four who voted with Bradley resisted the strongest appeals from the leaders of their party factions, declaring it was too late.

Misfortune, Says Bryan.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 28.—With regard to the election today of former Governor Bradley as United States senator from Kentucky, William J. Bryan said: "I cannot see where the election of Mr. Bradley will have any effect on national politics, but I consider it a great misfortune."

PLENTY OF ROOM FOR MEN

Question of Vacancy Arises Between Union Pacific and Commercial Telegraphers.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—When the hearing before the Interstate Commerce commission on the application for an extension of the nine-hour law was resumed today, Hilary A. Herbert, former secretary of the navy, made an argument in behalf of the Seaboard Air line. He contended that owing to the financial condition of the road it could not comply with the law without embarrassing the Seaboard Air line.

Mr. Dillard, representing the Union Pacific system, having stated that it would be impossible for his line at various remote stations to supply accommodations for a third operator, H. B. Perham, president of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, stated that he had received information from points along the Union Pacific that it was entirely possible for the extra operator to be provided with the extra accommodations at the stations named by Mr. Dillard.

BOMB FOR SHAH MISSES HIM

Precautions Taken for Safety Only Reason for Escape.

ROYAL AUTOMOBILE SHATTERED

TEHRAN, Persia, Feb. 28.—An attempt was made in this city this afternoon to assassinate the shah of Persia by a bomb. His majesty was not hurt. Three of the outsiders who were accompanying him at the time were killed.

The shah was in his escape to the precautions taken to protect him from just such an attempt as was made this afternoon. He was on his way to a nearby town, where he intended to pass a few days.

STUDENTS HONOR DOWLING

Young Men at Creighton Give Reception to Retiring President.

"PRINCIPLE," PARTING MESSAGE

After Fourteen Years of Distinguished Service as Head of Great University Dr. Dowling Leaves Down Work.

"Principle, that word I have spoken of more than any other; principle, that word which means so much, principle, is the last word I want to leave with you, my young friends."

Stating that the greatest pleasure he has received from his work here was the knowledge that he had done some good and that the students have honored to his message and profited by his words, Father Dowling spoke highly of the members of the faculty and that he would not take all the credit for the work done in the school, for nothing could have been accomplished but for the generosity of the late Count Creighton and the support of the entire faculty. He then pointed out the different branches of the local educational institution any other school of higher learning in that the members of the faculty in Creighton university receive no salary; they work for the love of the work, and therefore have something higher in their hearts than simply the duty of the hired educator who works for pay.

"I have Done My Best."

"I have done my best for Creighton university, but all that I will take away of that which is material will be about \$6, to get me to my new location. But I am content. We do not work for money; we have been dealing with you, students, for the greater glory of God and for the sake of humanity through you, for by your education received here you will be enabled to do more for mankind and for God and be worthy of Creighton university."

Tribute to Father Dowling.

The new president spoke highly of Father Dowling and of the retiring department which he said he had heard the most of, even before coming to Omaha.

Prior to the short talks by the old and new heads of the institution, Ray Stout, on the part of the retiring department of the school, and Ray Corrigan, on the part of the college department, gave short addresses, eulogizing Father Dowling and promising support to Father Magevney.

For Good of Young America.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Postmaster General Meyer is of the opinion that it is prejudicial to the welfare of "Young America" to employ him as a special delivery messenger on the regular service and has issued an order to the effect that whenever a vacancy occurs in the force of special delivery messengers the position shall not be filled and that substitute letter carriers and clerks shall be employed to effect special delivery. He states that these messengers are called upon frequently to visit long resorts and are often compelled to travel long distances late at night in lonely outlying sections of the great cities, falling to make deliveries at times through frost or weariness.

Extra Dividend Declared.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—The extra dividend of 87 per share on its preferred stock, calling for a disbursement of \$5,000,000, has been declared by the Oregon Railroad and Navigation company. It was learned today. Of the company's \$11,000,000 preferred stock the Union Pacific Railroad company and its auxiliaries own \$10,000,000. The Union Pacific and its auxiliaries also own practically all of the Oregon Railroad and Navigation company's \$1,000,000 of common stock. The road is operated as a part of the Union Pacific system.

Lumber Dealers in Trust.

JACKSON, Miss., Feb. 28.—Chancellor G. Garland Lytt today rendered a decree declaring that the Mississippi and Louisiana Retail Lumber Dealers' association is a trust and a combine and ordered that the organization be dissolved from business in Mississippi. The association has been operating under what is known as the "Mississippi plan," which provides for the boycotting of wholesalers or manufacturers who sell direct to consumers.

PRESERVATIVES TO BE USED.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—The use in small quantities of benzoin of soda and salicylic acid as food preservatives will be permitted pending the formal action of the referee board of consulting scientific experts, according to an order issued today by the Department of Agriculture.

NO REDUCTION OF SALARIES

Northern Pacific Declines to Comply Fully with New Nine-Hour Law.

ST. PAUL, Feb. 28.—There will be no reduction in the salaries of the telegraphers on the Northern Pacific on account of the federal "hours of service law" becoming effective March 1. The Northern Pacific will comply with the law and the men will work under much the same schedule of rules as at present, except that some of them have "split tricks" and that these work but nine hours, but will not be allowed a meal hour.

The question of a reduction in salaries and a rearrangement of working schedule was definitely disposed of today when the general committee representing the Northern Pacific telegraphers received a letter from Third Vice President Levy of the Northern Pacific.
