Wheat opened nervous and hung unsteady for some time after the opening. The buils then came to the front and took control in spite of lower cables and ran values up rapidly on the feature of the high cash bids millers are making and the light stocks held in reserve. May wheat opened at 19% and closed at 30%.

Corn opened very quiet, but firmed up a bit when wheat took its jump. The market did not show the right tone, however, and any selling put it on the decline. May corn opened at 16% and closed at 55%.

Oats were easier with corn and did not make any advance, being almost stationary throughout the session. May oats opened at 48% and closed at 49c.

Primary receipts were again very light and stocks of wheat in store at a number of grain centers were said to be greatly depleted. Selling throughout the day was chiefly by holders. Prices reacted considerably late in the session on realizing, but the close was firm. May opened ½ 6 lac lower to ½ 4½ c higher, at 97% 498% c, advanced to \$9% c and closed at 98% c. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 580,000 bushels, compared to 417,000 bush

Trade in corn was very light and the market failed to respond to the strength of wheat, sentiment in the pit being bearish all day. The easier tone was due to increased offerings from the country and to a slack demand for cash corn by shippers. The market closed easy. 
