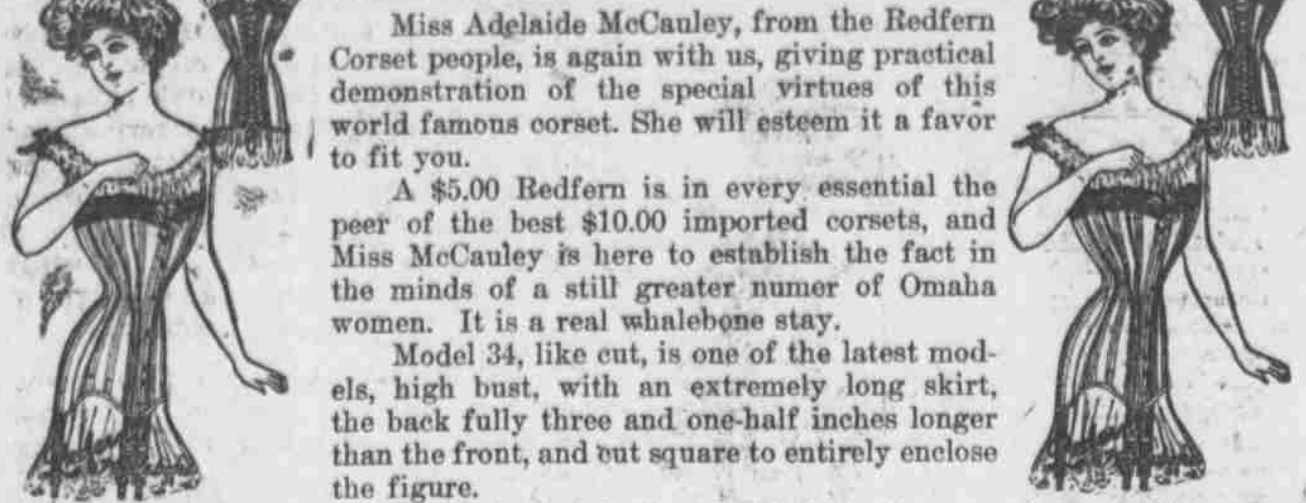

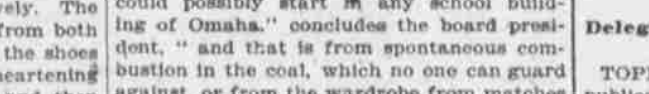

gates-at-large are Mayor Brown of Lincoln, W. H. Thompson of Grand Island, Dan V. Stephens of Fremont, Judge Oldham of Kearney and Ig Dunn of Omaha.

For district delegates a superabundance of candidates have secured entry cards, but the district conventions will settle their number. Each district can have two delegates to the national convention, but more than two have filed in each district.

In the First district J. W. Bonham of the police station, the local police chief, H. Henniger of Pawnee, Henry Geering of Plattsmouth, H. H. Hanks of Nebraska City, John Moorhead of Falls City and M. F. Connor of Auburn all want to go as delegates.

George Rogers of Omaha and Dr. McCrann of South Omaha already have secured delegates. The committee has down with no opponents. Douglas Shavano of Alton, James Hughes of Schuyler, Nick Frits of Pender and W. A. Smith of Deemer are the candidates in the Third district.

In the Fourth district the list of favorite sons include Jacob Klein of Debrairie, C. F. Gilbert of York, W. H. Deacon of Fairbury, M. H. Weiss of Hebron, J. F. Gereke of Seward, Peter Gibson of Aurora and E. O. Weber of Valparaiso.

Fifth district candidates for delegates-at-large are B. F. Scroggin of Nuckolls county, R. D. Logan of Frontier county and F. Modlin of Furnas county. X. Hasecki of Howard county, A. F. Mullin of O'Neill, A. M. Morley of Valentine and Joseph Oberfelder of Sidney are the candidates in the Sixth district.

The district convention, where the hopes of these numerous candidates will be for the first time, will be held at the hotel of 10 and 11 o'clock Thursday morning. The First and Second districts will scrap it out in the Dahlman, Democracy club rooms, the Third and Fourth districts at the Paxton hotel, and the Fifth and Sixth districts in the Auditorium.

H. H. Hanks of Nebraska City and J. A. Maguire of Lancaster county have both signed their willingness to go to congress from the First district. In the Third district Douglas Shavano of Alton, Editor Richmond of Fremont, State Senator Lott of Burt county, P. E. McKillip of Humphrey and Judge Graves are all congressional aspirants.

Fourth district candidates are Judge Thomas of Seward and C. M. Stables of David City, while in the Fifth district W. A. Austin of Grand Island and R. D. Sutherland of Nelson want to go to congress. Arthur Mullen of Holt county, Jess Grady of Broken Bow and Judge Westover of Rushville are the congressional candidates in the Sixth district.

Shallenberger, Berge, Dahlman and Lebeck will also give their gubernatorial best a trial flight at the state convention and the promise is made that there will be politics galore. Democratic headquarters are at the Paxton hotel and that will be the political center, but reservations have been made at the Millard, the Merchants and other hotels for the followers of Bryan. The populists who have called a state convention for Thursday, have headquarters at the Her Grand.

EVERYTHING WAITS ON BRYAN Peerless Leader Will Dominate and Make the Platform.

William Jennings Bryan, who arrives this morning from the south, will be the supreme dictator of the convention, and the main idea of every delegate, whether he be big or little, is to please "the com-mo-ner" in every respect.

Some of the democrats now in the city believe it would be best to prepare a simple platform, short and to the point, declaring merely the "cardinal principles of democracy." Others, however, take the ground that Nebraska, Bryan's home state, ought to set the pace and adopt a "long, ringing platform which will be a forerunner and give an idea of what the Denver platform will contain." But it is up to Mr. Bryan to say the word.

GREUTNER AT HEADQUARTERS Secretary of State Committee in Charge is Zealous.

Democratic headquarters at the Paxton hotel are in charge of C. M. Gruenther, secretary of the state committee and of the Bryan Volunteers. Mr. Gruenther is editor of the Plattsmouth Herald and is a firm believer that now is the accepted time, now the day of salvation for the democratic party of Nebraska.

"There has not been so much enthusiasm among the democrats of the state for years as this is this year," says Mr. Gruenther, "from 1892 to the year there have been big fights the enthusiasm has not been so marked. We will have full delegations from every county in the state this time, something which has not been the case for a long time."

But while talking glibly of democratic success in general, the committee secretary shut up like a clam when asked about the gubernatorial situation, using the old stereotyped phrase that all the candidates are good men. To the question regarding the advisability of nominating

DETAILS OF CONVENTION PLANS Paxton Hotel is Selected as Headquarters for Delegates.

Omaha is today the Mecca for the democratic hosts of Nebraska who are gathering for their state convention which will be held Thursday afternoon. The big pow wow will be held in the Auditorium and 1,500 delegates will be given seats, the votes being divided in some districts so as to give every democrat who attends the love feast a choice.

The preliminaries will be thrashed out in committee meetings in the morning and the whole program will be cut and dried for the convention, which will be called at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, making the afternoon meeting practically a ratification affair. The work of the convention will be rushed so as to finish in the afternoon and leave the coast clear for the democracy's beloved Bryan, who will hold down the boards in the evening.

Bryan is scheduled to speak at 9 o'clock. From the present status of affairs, the only possible scrap seems to be that over the election of delegates-at-large in the national convention. There are five candidates for the four places, none of whom have enough votes to elect. Ig Dunn of Omaha is in the best shape of any of the bunch, having the pledged support of Lancaster county, as well as that of Douglas. The other four candidates are merely the support of their home counties so far. The five candidates for dele-

either Dahlman or Lebeck for governor on the ground that they had never been defeated for the office, while Berge was beaten in 1904 and Shallenberger in 1906. Mr. Gruenther cited the fact that it was only after repeated failures that atlasta was made to grow in this state, and that now it is one of Nebraska's best crops.

"You can apply the fact of atlasta to the gubernatorial if you want to, but I decline to be interviewed."

COSGROVE SURRENDERS TO JIM Belligerent Jack Lowers His Flag for Sake of Peace.

In the interest of harmony and acting upon the advice of leading democrats from over the state, the protest filed by Fred H. Cosgrove, a leader of the Jacks, at the time of the selecting of the Douglas county delegation in the Paxton hotel on the evening of February 14, will not be presented or pushed in the state convention, notwithstanding the method of selecting the delegates, which he claims to be entirely irregular and not in accord with the call of the state committee.

"I am ready to abide by the decision of the state leaders, who fully agree with me and my position, but who advise in the absence of a contesting delegation, which could be stated as the matter be not further prosecuted," says Mr. Cosgrove. Pending the decision of Mr. Cosgrove regarding his protest, the Jacksonians have placed no man in the field for chairmanship of the Douglas county delegation to the state convention. As the Dahlmanites have been working overtime and have secured some ninety pledges for Mayor Jim for chairman, the Jacksonians confess that they will probably not even have a "look-in" on the chairmanship.

HASTINGS, Neb., March 4.—(Special Telegram.)—The ministers of the "life saving" church, which are the members of seven churches, this morning denied that they had received a letter containing threats against their lives. It was reported in a Hastings dispatch to an Omaha paper yesterday that ministers of the union had been threatened with death on penalty of death to stop the war against the saloons.

Rev. R. A. Schell of the Christian church said today he had received two valentines and a newspaper clipping from an unknown source. Rev. L. W. Nino of the United Brethren church admitted receiving two anonymous postal cards. Both declared that while offensive, they were in no way threatening. No other ministers, so far as known, have received anonymous letters bearing on the fight against the saloons.
