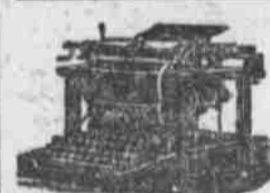

Hard Day for Vagrants—Friday was a hard day for vagrants in police court. Judge Crawford distributed fifteen thirty-day sentences and four of ten days each. The total sentences to the county jail amounted to a year and four months.
Gasoline Stove Gets in its Work—A gasoline stove used for cooking in the frame cottage, 522 North Fifteenth street, set fire to the wall paper Friday morning and did damage amounting to \$25 before it was extinguished. The house is occupied by Charles W. Rogers.
Children Properly Cared for—Officer Carver of the probation office reports that the two children of Mrs. George Carl in the emergency hospital are not destitute and without care, but are being properly and safely cared for by Mrs. George Cleveland, Sixth and Davenport streets.
New Collector About March 15—Ross L. Hammond, new collector of internal revenue for the Nebraska district, will enter upon his duties about March 15. Some formalities relative to his bond have yet to be completed, and it will take to that time at least to conclude the formalities for the transfer of the office.
James Allen Still Improves—James Allen is still making good progress toward

recovery at St. Joseph's hospital. Another operation will be necessary, however, before he is able to leave the hospital. This operation, Dr. Schleier says, will be performed in a week or ten days.
Michaelson to Talk at Y. M. C. A.—City Electrician Michaelson will give a talk at the Young Men's Christian association Tuesday night on "What It Means to Be An Electrical Engineer." This is the second of a series of life work talks given under the direction of the educational department.
Patent Infringement Suit—Arguments on the motion for a decree in the infringement of patent suit of the Alsop Process company against Naylor & Gerrard, millers, of Columbus, were made in the United States circuit court Friday morning before Judge W. H. Munger, and the court took the matter under advisement.
Promotion of Missions—The annual prayer service of the Women's Missionary society was held in the First Presbyterian church Friday afternoon. Rev. R. N. Adams, D. D., field secretary of the Home Mission Board, and Rev. William H. Kearna, D. D., Nebraska superintendent of missions, spoke. Dr. E. H. Jenks had charge of the devotional hour.
New Deputy United States Marshal—Arthur M. Bartlett of Chadron has been appointed and qualified as deputy United States marshal for the Chadron district to succeed Earl Mathews. Mr. Bartlett's territory will comprise all of the northwestern counties of the state, with headquarters at Chadron. The new deputy marshal is a ranchman living near Chadron.
Delegates Homeward Bound—There was a noticeable heira of the democratic faithful from the hotels Friday morning. Among the first to leave was Colonel W. J. Bryan. He was accompanied homeward to Lincoln by R. H. Ingersoll of New York, the watch man, who was the guest of Mr. Bryan at the Paxton during the convention.
Meadow Grove Citizen is Free—Robert Holland, who was arrested Wednesday evening on the deserted fifth floor of the United States National Bank building, Twelfth and Farnam streets, where he was knocking vigorously on all the doors and calling his wife, when he believed to be hiding there, was discharged in police court Friday. He lives in Meadow Grove.
J. J. Merzhon Buys New Site—J. J. Merzhon, proprietor of the Boston Lunch counter on Farnam street, has closed a deal for the building at 1408 Douglas street, where he opens a new restaurant to be conducted on the same plan as the Farnam street counter. The building belonged to Margaret B. Burgess and has been occupied by a trunk factory for years. Mr. Merzhon paid \$18,000 for the property.
Twenty Dollars Fine for G. H. Bowman—C. H. Bowman of Perry, Ia., a conductor, was fined \$20 and costs in police court Friday. He was arrested by Emergency Officer Morgan Thursday at 618 South Seventeenth street on complaint of a woman with whom he had formerly lived. She alleged in court that he had burst into the room, flourished a revolver, and had seized a shirt waist she was making and put it into the stove.
Inquiries on Cleaning Streets—The municipal affairs committee of the Commercial club is sending out a large number of letters to other cities to inquire into the street cleaning methods, wages paid sweepers, machines used and the results obtained. With a special committee from the Real Estate exchange the committee will push an active campaign for reform and improvement in the street cleaning of Omaha.
Omaha Elks to Visit E. C. Lodge—Several members of the Omaha lodge of Elks, including the officers, propose attending the meeting of the Kansas City lodge Saturday evening, it being their intention to go to Kansas City Saturday morning. Nine members of Omaha lodge are now living in Kansas City, and they, together with T. E. Haife and other members of the lodge now sojourning at Excelsior Springs, will meet

Missouri city. Just twenty years ago, Omaha lodge presented to the Kansas City Elks a gold emblem valued at over \$1,000 and it has since been one of their most cherished possessions. A welcome, therefore, awaits the Omaha Elks on their arrival in Kansas City.

Restaurant Sues for \$10,000 Damages—Charging the Joseph Schlitz Brewing company and Fred Vogie, Jr., through their agent, with having ruined his restaurant business by putting a skating rink in the rooms above it, George W. Carman has begun suit in district court for \$10,000 damages. Carman rents a room at 511 North Sixteenth street from the defendants. A short time ago he says one of the basement rooms was occupied for immoral purposes and he complained to the police. The latter raided the place and he asserts the owners of the building are now trying to force him out of the building. To do this he says they put the skating rink for colored people in Oshoff's hall above his restaurant. The noise and confusion resulting from it he says have driven all his customers away.
