In the Field of Electricity

When the first wireless message was finished across the Atlantic on October 17, 1897, the tremendous significance of the event appealed to all the world. Here was an invention which promised to put all the great cable companies out of business, and to turn their billions of dollars' worth of elaborate machinery in useless junk. Electricity and Precious Stones.

One of the interesting features of the great industry conducted by the General Electric company is its trade in precious stones. In the course of a year the company uses many thousands of dollars' worth of diamonds and sapphires, which are being constantly shipped in from Australia, Holland, London, Paris, Brazil and New Zealand. The stones are employed for bearings in electric meters such as are employed to register the number of kilowatt hours of energy used in the home. In order that the meters shall be accurate there must be practically no friction in the bearings. The mechanism of a meter turns in proportion to the amount of light burned or energy used. The wearing parts must be as hard as possible, that constant use will not wear and create additional friction, consequently diamonds and sapphires have to be used in the shaft bearings. The diamond is the hardest substance in the world, and the sapphire ranks a close second. The bearings made of these precious stones have a long life, and, though they originally cost more, they are the cheapest in the long run.

Increased Candle Power.

Using an apparatus of his own which he attached to an electric light fixture, J. Allen Heany, an expert metallurgist, produced a light of seventy-five candle-power by the use of ferro tungsten, employing no more electric current, he said, than is needed for an ordinary sixteen candle-power lamp. The experiment was conducted in the trial room where the United States Board of General Appraisers in New York were trying a case against the Midvale Steel company. The trial was to determine the duties which may be imposed on certain metalliferous ores im-

Electric Light and Eyesight.

As the result of simultaneous investigation in Great Britain, America and Germany, information on the subject of artificial illumination in its effects upon the sight has been recently extended by several valuable contributions. In Germany Messrs. Schanz and Stockhausen have found that the maximum brightness that the eye can bear without injury is 0.75 heifer candle per square centimeter, and that unshaded carbon filament lamps have a brightness 100 times as great, metallic filaments 250, Nernst lamps 600 and arc lamps 4,000 times.
