Grew Out of Jenlousy. "That was a private match," said Burns, 'and one of the best I ever saw. It was pulled off in New York by a crowd of wrestlers and grew out of jealousy. Pol-lack backed Jenkins and Harvey Parker Beell. The purse was \$1,000. Beell won in two hours and forty-two minutes.

"He's an awful nice little fellow and a great wrestler. He may throw me, but I hope to win; I am especially anxious to win, but if he wins I will not feel badly, He is a clean and good man. "I tell you the truth, I am beginning to

feel my age. I am now past 47 and I lack the ambition of my former years. It used to be that when I entered the ring I said to myself, 'My, here's my chance for a good tussle; let me at him.' Now when I get on the mat I say to myself. 'Oh. I have an hour or two of hard work which I wish was over.' I used to get out and run over the bills and like it. Now when I start up a hill I look to the top and say, 'There's that big hill I've get to climb.' But I'm not all in yet. Of course I have got to get beat sooner or later, but I'll do my best to the end. I have been wrestling for thirty-nine years, ever since I was 8 years

BIG ROW IN THREE-I LEAGUE Dubuque Franchise is Forfeited and

Three Cities Withdraw. CHICAGO, March 12—E. M. Holland of Bloomington was tonight re-elected president of the Three-I Base Ball league for 1806, after a long contest that threatened to disrupt the organization. The matter of the Dubuque franchise, which was carlier decided forfeited, then reinstated, and again nullified, contributed to the misunderstandings among the club owners. At midnight Clinton, Cedar Rapids and Rock Island had been declared out of the league by their representatives, who left the meeting and for a long time refused to take further part in the proceedings. Whether the election of Mr. Holland or the status of the Dubuque matter had caused this split could not be learned, the disgruntled club owners refusing to discuss their grievances, while no word came from the room in which the other members of the league were continuing their stormy session. Holland was chosen executive of the league only after more than a score of ballots had been taken. After sineteen ballots Holland was finally declared elected only four clubs were voting. No effort to adopt a schedule had been made when the meeting adjourned. One had been prepared, but the uncertainty of the Dubuque franchise and the disaffection of the other threes clubs left it valueless. Athletic Board Decides to Cast Its Lot With Missouri Valley.

MOVE FOR CLEANER ATHLETICS

Board of Regents Expected to Take Action at Once on New Athletic Field, and Indications Board Will Help Out.

LINCOLN, March 12 - (Special.)-The athletic board of the University of Nebraska at a special meeting today voted to join the Missouri Valley conference and will send a representative to the meeting of the new organization at Kansas City on

Saturday, March 21. As foretold in The Sunday Bee March & the board acted upon the recommendation of the foot ball committee and unanimously decided to enter Nebraska in the conference. The committee, which is composed of Dr. Lees, Nebraska's member of the national foot ball rules committee; Captain John G. Workizer, president of the athletic board, and J. H. Murphy, student member of the board, had investigated the advisability of Nebraska's joining an athletic association and found the best thing to do would be for the Cornhuskers to cast their lot with the Missourt Valley conference. The action of the athletic board today was the result of the committee's re-

The Missouri Valley conference is now emposed of Nebrasks, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Ames, Washington, Drake and Washburn. The association was formed over a year ago to control the athletics of the valley and make them cleaner. The other members of the conference joined soon after its formation, but Nebraska held aloof until today, preferring to be a free lance while waiting for the "Big Eight," or old conference, to extend it an invitation to join their organization. But when it seemed that the "Big Eight" would not ask the Cornbuskers to become a member of the old body, the Nebraska Athletic board decided that they did not want to, even

if invited. The next meeting of the Missouri Valley Saturday, March 21, for a purpose of fixing a date for the first annual track meet, Nebraska's representative will vote to hold the meet in Kansas City on May 16. At the same time he will try to secure the consent of the other members to hold the next meet a year from this spring in Lincoln. The committee appointed by the Board of Regents to look into the matter of securing

an athletic field for the university will report tomorrow afternoon. Upon its action depends the getting of a new field to replace Nebraska field, which has been selected as the site for an engineering building. The Board of Regents has been asked to co-operate with the athletic authorities in securing the new grounds. It is expected that the committee from the regents will recommend that aid be given the athletic board.
