DUBLIN, March 14-(Special.)-The result of the North Leitrim election, while it has surprised no one, has been very interesting as showing the really great growth of the Sinn Fein movement. Mr. Dolan, M. These figures require a little explaining to those who have not watched the contest closely and who are not familiar with the local conditions. Mr. Meehan, the official nationalist candidate, received 2,100 votes, while Mr. Dolan, the Sinn Peiner, polled 1,157 votes. Most significant of all is the fact that more than in a constituency where every man is a keen politician and where the public interest was aroused as it has not been since the days of O'Connell.

Clergy Fears Sinn Feiners. The secret of it all was that all the power of the clergy was exerted on behalf of Mr. Mechan, for the clergy fear and dislike the Sinn Fein movement, which in some parts of Ireland has taken an anti-clerical The fact that 1,157 men could be found in a constituency like North Leitrim to fly in the face of their priests is significant of the strength of the new movement, and it is safe to assume that the 2.000 who stayed at home were in fayor of Mr. Dolan, but did not care to antagonize the clergy. If this assumption is correct it will be seen that the constituency was



'It is its growing importance as a naval and military power that most disturbs them.
