> COMMANDS THE PACIFIC FLEET Popular and Bluff "Fighting Bob" Evans, Who Takes Fleet Around the Horn.

Fighting Bob, the hero of Fort Pisher, reires in August of next year, and the crowning event of an evenful life will be his command of the great fleet that sails this month to the Pacific. Had it not been for that wayward minie ball at the fight of Fort Fisher, Robley D. Evans would have been passod into the retired list before now, for he is over sixty-one years of age, having been born in Floyd county, Va. in August, 1846.

The incident at Fort Fisher showed the mbryonic admiral's nerve. In the heat of the land atttack Evans was so seriously wounded that he was forced to retire from the zone of fire to receive the attention of the surgeons. Simultaneously a young ensign was struck and reeled to the ground. Ignering his own condition, Evans lifted him in his arms and carried him to a place of safety. Gongress gave Evans thirty numbers for the act of bravery.

"Fighting Bob" is known the world over. An equally fearless act earned him his sobriquet. It was at the time the United States steamship Yorktown, under his command, lay in the harbor of Valparaiso in 1891. The American officer had suffered numerous indignities at the hands of a Chilian mob, due to the anti-American feeling as the result of our interference in the Chillan-Peruvian war. Evans determined to bring matters to a head. Armed with a gig's crew, he cleared his ship for action and went ashore, notified the Chillan authorities that his bont's crew was armed and that "he would protect himself if they did not.
