

NO RE-ENLISTMENTS IN ARMY

Old Men Decline to Go Back into Private Ranks.

MARCHING ORDERS ARE SEVERE

Attack on Redoubt at Fort Riley Will Take Place in August, Month Earlier Than Planned.

PORT RILEY, Kan., July 27.—(Special.)—Colonel Riley, assistant quartermaster general of the army, arrived at Fort Riley on Sunday night and on Monday his entire time was given to inspecting proposed sites for building in original plan.

General Godfrey and Colonel Macomber accompanied him. Colonel Macomber was until 1892 the commanding officer of the post and there is no one any better qualified to speak of its great facilities as a brigade station than he.

About fifty enlisted men of the troops of the Second and Thirteenth cavalry squadrons have been transferred to organizations of the Seventh cavalry which are expected to arrive some time this afternoon.

Troops of cavalry when stationed at this training school have an authorized strength which is twenty more than when stationed at other garrisons, and in case of their being ordered to other points or stations this surplus number is transferred to the incoming troops.

The second cavalry of the Second cavalry, commanded by Captain Wade, in the absence of the squadron commander, marched from the garrison early this morning en route to Fort Leavenworth, Kan., where it will entrain for Fort Des Moines.

The number of general prisoners was increased the first of the week by the arrival of ten from Fort Crook, Neb., under the charge of a noncommissioned officer and six enlisted men from the Sixth field artillery. The prisoners are short-term men and were sent here to furnish labor on the roads about the garrison.

There is some talk that the attack on the Redoubt, which has been scheduled for the first of August, will occur a month earlier, and this has given rise to all manner of wild rumors relative to going to the front.

The recent tragedy in Hampton Roads resulting in the loss of the lives of six midshipmen and five enlisted men of the navy is one of the series of momentous disasters which have overtaken the navy in times of peace.

Of course, the principal disaster in recent years has been the blowing up of the Maine in Havana harbor on February 15, 1898.

Another naval disaster which attracted much attention at the time was the wrecking of the Kearsarge in February, 1894.

Another naval explosion of recent years which suggested the Maine disaster in its effect was that of the United States ship Bennington in July, 1895.

Another accident in the navy which taught its lesson and led to reforms was the explosion on board the Missouri.

Another wreck of importance was that of the Charleston, in command of Captain G. W. Pigman, the ship while in Philippine waters on November 1, 1890, struck on some rocks and was wrecked.

Conspicuous in the list of naval disasters was that of the U. S. S. Albatross, which was wrecked in the hurricane of March 16, 1892.
