

RAILROADS TURNED DOWN

Board of Equalization Refuses to Pass on Bill of Exceptions.

LABORERS OF BOARD COMPLETED

Amount of Levy if Collected Will Exceed by a Considerable Amount Appropriations of the Last Legislature.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Aug. 1.—(Special.)—The State Board of Equalization back tracked on its refusal to grant the request of the Union Pacific for a record showing the board had refused to increase land values by re-examining that action, and then turned right around and did the same thing again by including in its final resolution a denial of the remonstrance of the Union Pacific.

When Edson Rich, attorney for the railroad, asked that the resolution be adopted, Mr. Rich was objected and voted alone against adopting the suggestion of the railroad lawyer. Mr. Rich held that Mr. Rich had no right to attempt to make up the records of the board, but that if he wanted a bill of exceptions or any kind of record he should take it from the records of the board, and to keep it in his own hands.

Other members of the board, however, voted for the Rich resolution, after slightly modifying it. Then, fearing they probably had made it easier for the railroad to get into the courts, all the other members endorsed Mr. Rich's stand by voting to rescind their action.

Mr. Rich was again before the board this morning to appear for his bill of exceptions, but he failed to show up until late this afternoon.

After a debate lasting the remainder of the afternoon, the board turned down the request of Mr. Rich for a bill of exceptions. Mr. Rich was prepared by his attorneys regarding the valuation of personal property, which the board said had nothing to do with the land values, and therefore had no place in the error proceedings. The action of the board in refusing the request had the sanction of the attorney general.

While Mr. Thompson and Mr. Rich were consulting an attorney to get together Governor Sheldon announced that the attorneys could not get together the board could, and at once the vote was taken and the request turned down. The Union Pacific will appeal to the supreme court for a mandamus to compel the board to give it the bill of exceptions.

Official Finding of Board. Following is the official finding of the board: Whereas, The State Board of Equalization and Assessment of the state of Nebraska has been organized since July 18, 1897, for equalizing the assessment of property within the state, so as to make the same conform to law;

Whereas, The board having had under consideration the valuation of property in the counties of the state returned to this board, and having determined that the same was undervalued, and that the proper, fair, true and equitable assessment and equalization in such counties; that the assessments in the several counties of this state and returned to this board by the county boards of this state, are undervalued to the extent of four per cent;

That the class of property designated below, in the counties hereinafter named, should be increased and decreased by the following percentages: Be it further Resolved, Adjudged and Decreed by said Board of Equalization and Assessment of the state of Nebraska, that the class of property indicated in the following table should be increased and decreased by the following percentages:

Coins Worn Past Identification Worth Only Metal Value.

WITH GOLD PIECES IT IS NOT SO

Government Has Table of Decrease in Weights Naturally to Be Expected from Ordinary Wear.

The worn and mutilated coins in Omaha circulation are bought up by dealers in Chicago, said G. T. Zimmermann, paying teller in the First National bank. "Whenever the bank receives a coin that is worn so that it cannot be recognized or that is plugged or mutilated in any way, the teller puts it away in a bag kept for that purpose.

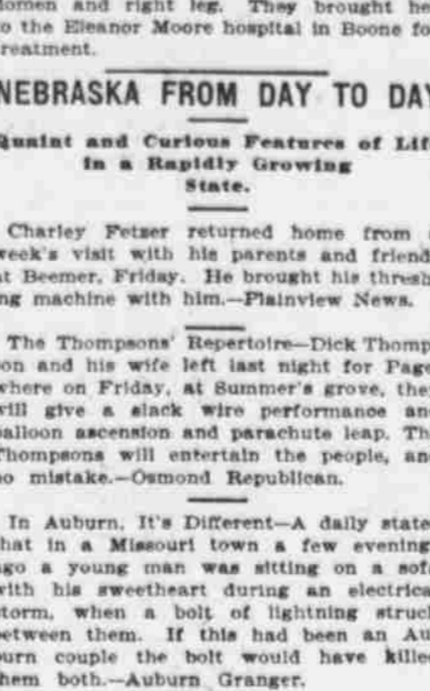
