MILWAUKEE WILL HAVE FLEET When Line Reaches Pacific Coast Steamers for Eastern Trade

Will Be Ready. SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 2.-President A. J. Earling of the Chicago, Milwaukee St. Paul, in an interview here last night, said that the railroad company would have a fleet of nine large steamships plying between Seattle and the Orient when the extension of his road is finished in 1909.
